ACCT16300 Introduction to Accounting **6 cr pts**
Students are introduced to the basic principles and procedures of double entry accounting in the context of the historical cost model. The course covers the accounting cycle, including source documents, journals, ledgers, adjustments to produce financial statements for external reporting and other relevant financial information for the unincorporated business. The unit explores the various assumptions made in the measurement of performance, the valuation of assets and the design and operation of information systems.

ACCT16500 Financial Accounting and Reporting **6 cr pts**
This unit extends the students' understanding of the broad accounting framework. Attention is given to the structure of organisations and the fundamentals of management, accounting and finance. An essential part of the course is devoted to an understanding and analysis of accounting reports.

ACCT22600 Business Systems Applications **6 cr pts**
This unit investigates methods of utilising the computer to perform accounting and other business functions. The accounting functions are addressed using the *Premier MYOB* accounting package. Management decision-making is addressed using the advanced functions of Microsoft *Excel*, including Macros, What-if-analysis, Goal seeker, Solver and Pivot Tables. Students are challenged to analyse the potential of using the computer in a systems approach developing new and innovative solutions to business problems.

ACCT26000 Corporate Accounting **6 cr pts**
A study of financial accounting and reporting for individual corporations and corporate group structures. It extends areas such as company formation, operation, taxation, liquidation, and acquisitions. It progresses to the preparation of published financial statements which adequately disclose the results and position of the corporate investment structure. Content includes consolidated group accounts, accounting for investments in associates and disclosure requirements.

ACCT26400 Management Accounting Fundamentals **6 cr pts**
The basic principles and procedures of management and cost accounting are presented within the framework of management's need for three different types of information:
1 Product costing for inventory valuation and profit

measurement

- 2 Differential costs for decision making
- 3 Cost data for performance evaluation.

Prerequisite

ACCT16300 Introduction to Accounting

ACCT26500 Management Decisions and Control 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to give students understanding in cost measurement, and reporting to management at various levels in organisations for manufacturing and service industries. The course covers the problems of cost accumulation, allocation, and processing for joint production, pricing, and divisional performance, planning, control and evaluation.

ACCT26400 Management Accounting Fundamentals

ACCT28600 Internship in Accounting 6 cr pts

This internship is designed for students to gain an understanding of how to function in the workplace. Students work for a minimum of 50 hours per two academic credits in a professional workplace related to their field of study. On concluding the work-placement, students complete a written report on their experience.

ACCT29500 Guided Studies in Accounting 6 cr pts

An independent reading and research unit that focuses on selected areas of accounting which are of interest to the student. It provides the student with an opportunity to critically review recent literature materials relating to the theory and practice of accounting. Regular tutorial periods are required for the review of the chosen literature materials.

ACCT31500 Contemporary Accounting Issues 6 cr pts

An analysis of current issues in financial accounting and external reporting. Broad issues are covered such as methods of solving accounting issues; the definition, recognition, measurement and matching of issues in financial accounting and reporting; external reporting and disclosure issues; regulatory issues and ethics.

ACCT26000 Corporate Accounting

ACCT31700 Accounting Theories 6 cr pts

The major theories of accounting and their potential application in practice are introduced in this unit. It addresses the problem of formulating an accounting theory and presents the principal approaches. It also examines the various factors that contribute to the formulation of a theory, history and development of the discipline; the various accounting research paradigms and the regulatory framework.

ACCT33400 Auditing and Assurance Services 6 cr pts

A study of the major principles and procedures of auditing viewed from the systems perspective. It includes the legal and professional responsibilities of both the internal and external auditors. Study also will be devoted to auditing in an EDP environment.

ACCT26000 Corporate Accounting

ACCT34200 Australian Tax Law and Practice 6 cr pts

A study of the law and practice underpinning the Australian Federal Taxation System. Content includes the history and role of taxation in Australia, tax administration, concepts of income, allowable deductions, fringe benefits tax, capital gains tax and retiring allowances, rebates; taxation and the individual, and tax accounting.

ACCT26000 Corporate Accounting

ACCT35200 Accounting Project 6 cr pts

Each student is to develop a research proposal with an organisation of his/her choice, gather and analyse data, and present the results in the form of a written report (3,000–4,000 words).

ACCT39600 Independent Topic in Accounting 6 cr pts

Each student is required to analyse, design and present the results of a study program in accounting-related field in which they are particularly interested. The form of the written report will normally be up to 3,000 words, excluding a bibliography. The proposed area of study must be approved by the supervisor appointed by the Faculty before it is carried out.

BBBI10500 Introduction to Biblical Interpretation 6 cr pts

The unit provides students with an introduction to the Bible as canon, understood as the Word of God. It covers the area of revelation and inspiration, introduces the texts and various literary genres of the Bible against their historical and cultural background, and helps students to develop hermeneutical tools in order to properly apply the biblical texts of ancient cultures to the culture of today.

BBBI26000/BBBI36000 Biblical Apocalypses 6 cr pts

Biblical Apocalypses provides an introduction to the books of Daniel and Revelation with an emphasis on developing principles for interpreting apocalyptic literature that takes cognizance of the original hearers and their historical context.

BBBI46000 Jewish and Christian Apocalyptic Literature 6 cr pts

Biblical Apocalypses provides an introduction to the books of Daniel and Revelation with an emphasis on developing principles for interpreting apocalyptic literature that takes cognizance of the original hearers and their historical context.

BBBL16000 New Testament Greek IA 6 cr pts

This unit is the first stage of providing the student with the ability to use New Testament Greek as a tool for New Testament study. Following an introduction to the grammar of New Testament Greek, some experience is given in reading selected verses of the Greek text of the New Testament.

BBBL16100 New Testament Greek IB 6 cr pts

This unit is the second stage in providing the student with the ability to use New Testament Greek as a tool for New Testament study. Following further development of an understanding of the grammar of New Testament Greek, experience is given in the translation and exegesis of selected portions of the Greek text of the New Testament.

BBBL16000 New Testament Greek 1A

BBBL17000 Hebrew A 6 cr pts

This unit introduces the student to the elements of Hebrew phonology, word formation and grammar, with particular emphasis on understanding the verb and building a vocabulary of the most frequently used words in the Old Testament. Students will translate selected Old Testament prose passages.

BBBL17100 Hebrew B 6 cr pts

The second semester of biblical Hebrew will complete the survey of the textbook and translate narratives selected from Genesis, Ruth and Jonah. Selected Psalms will be translated to introduce Hebrew poetry. Grammar and syntax issues will be discussed. Emphasis will be placed on greater familiarity with the verbal system.

BBBL26000 New Testament Greek IIA 6 cr pts

This unit studies selected topics in intermediate Greek syntax and grammar concurrent with translation and exegesis of selected passages of Koine Greek (mainly taken from the New Testament).

Prerequisite

BBBL16100 New Testament Greek IB

BBBL26100 New Testament Greek IIB 6 cr pts

This unit studies selected topics in intermediate Greek syntax and grammar concurrent with translation and exegesis of selected passages of Koine Greek (mainly taken from the New Testament).

Prerequisite

BBB16100 New Testament Greek IB

BBBL46000 New Testament Greek IA 6 cr pts

This unit studies selected topics in intermediate Greek syntax and grammar concurrent with translation and exegesis of selected passages of Koine Greek (mainly taken from the New Testament).

BBBL46100 New Testament Greek IB 6 cr pts

This unit studies selected topics in intermediate Greek syntax and grammar concurrent with translation and exegesis of selected passages of Koine Greek (mainly taken from the New Testament).

BBBL47000 Hebrew A 6 cr pts

This unit introduces the student to the elements of Hebrew phonology, word formation and grammar, with particular emphasis on understanding the verb and building a vocabulary of the most frequently used words in the Old Testament. Students will translate selected Old Testament prose passages.

BBNT16000 Gospels A 6 cr pts

While providing a general introduction to the Bible in its social and historical context, and how it is studied in an academic context, this unit's main focus is on the Gospels of Mark and Luke as witnesses to the person, life, and teaching of Jesus Christ. It introduces basic Scripture exegesis skills, and gives attention to the introduction, historical background, and theology of the Gospels.

BBNT17000 New Testament Epistles A 6 cr pts

This unit is concerned with the study of Romans and I and II Corinthians, as well as selected passages from other New Testament epistles. Attention will first be given to the introductory issues related to the epistle under consideration. This will be followed by an analysis of the letter's overall message and an exegesis of some of the more significant sections of each letter.

BBNT35100 Gospels B 6 cr pts

This unit studies the Gospels of Matthew and John as witnesses to the person, life and teaching of Jesus Christ. Particular attention is devoted to Matthew's special material, and Johannine imagery and theology. The two Gospels' distinct portrayals of the Passion are also analysed.

BBBL16100 New Testament Greek IB;

plus any 200-level unit in the BTh/BMin degrees with a BBNT, BBOT, THCH or THSY prefix.

BBNT36100 New Testament Epistles B 6 cr pts

This unit is concerned with the study of selected New Testament epistles. Attention will be given to the social milieu and introductory problems related to the epistle under consideration. An analysis of the letter's overall message and an exegesis of selected sections the Greek text of each letter will follow.

BBBL16100 New Testament Greek IB

BBNT17000 Epistles A

plus any 200-level unit with a BBNT, BBOT, THCH or THSY prefix.

BBNT36200 New Testament Apocalypses 6 cr pts

This unit is a study of the parts of the New Testament which are considered to have the characteristics of apocalypses, especially the book of Revelation. The unit focuses on exegesis, and includes a survey of the history of interpretation, plus application to the contemporary church and society.

Prerequisites

BBBL16100 New Testament Greek IB
and one BBNT unit at 200-level

BBOT26200 Pentateuch 6 cr pts

This unit gives a general introduction to the background, structure, and themes of the Pentateuch. It especially develops the student's Hebrew exegetical skills through hands-on study.

Prerequisite

BBBL17000 Hebrew A

BBOT26500 Old Testament Prophets 6 cr pts

This unit provides a general introduction to the phenomenon of prophecy and prophetic literature, followed by a specific introduction to the Hebrew prophets of the Assyrian, Babylonian, and Persian eras. Selected Hebrew passages will be exegeted with reference to Old Testament historical texts.

Prerequisites

BL170 Hebrew A

BBOT28200 Pentateuchal Studies 6 cr pts

This unit introduces the student to the background, exegesis and themes of the first five books of the Hebrew Bible.

BBOT36100 Old Testament Seers and Sages 6 cr pts

This unit is a study of the Hebrew biblical Apocalypses and wisdom literature, with special focus on the book of Daniel, to discover their meaning and relevance for today.

Prerequisite

BBBL17000 Hebrew A

BBOT48200 Pentateuchal Studies 6 cr pts

This unit introduces the student to exegesis of the Hebrew Bible by focusing on its first five books. It also continues the survey of Hebrew grammar begun in Hebrew A. Passages are selected for exegesis which highlight the main themes of the Pentateuch.

BBRN22000 Guided Studies in Biblical Studies I 6 cr pts

This 200-level independent reading and research unit focuses on selected areas of biblical studies which are of interest to the student. It provides the student with a supervised opportunity to describe and evaluate materials in the area

BBRN32000 Guided Studies in Biblical Studies II 6 cr pts

This 300-level independent reading and research unit focuses on selected areas of biblical studies which are of interest to the student. It provides the student with a supervised opportunity to critically analyse materials in the area.

BBRN36100 Independent Topic—Biblical Studies 6 cr pts

Guided reading and research on an issue/s or topic/s in Biblical Studies is undertaken in the unit. It may involve the preparation and submission of one or two papers (totalling

6,000 words) on a specific issue/s or topic/s related to the relevant literature, or a series of reading reports with associated discussion. It could be based on a small research project but is more likely to be an extended essay/s based on library/other sources research.

BBTR20100 Bible Lands Study Tour 6 cr pts

This unit involves an exploration of the Bible Lands through assigned reading, visitation of biblical sites, attendance at specialist lectures, and the preparation of written reports. It provides a background for greater insight into understanding the Hebrew and Christian Scriptures.

BIOL16000 Biology I 6 cr pts

An introductory unit in general biology that covers a variety of biological themes including the cell and cell division; taxonomy, systematics and the diversity of life; vascular plant anatomy; Mendelian genetics; and evolution.

Prerequisite

Year 12 Biology or equivalent strongly recommended

BIOL16100 Comparative Functional Biology 6 cr pts

Comparative functional biology provides insight into the variety and complexity of anatomy and physiology found in animals and protists. Special consideration is given to the major body systems of animals, both invertebrates and vertebrates. Various phyla and classes are compared to demonstrate the relationship between the anatomy and physiology of an organism and its mode of life.

Prerequisite

Year 12 Biology or equivalent strongly recommended

BIOL20000 General Biology 6 cr pts

An introductory unit in general biology that covers a variety of biological themes including the cell and cell division; genetic engineering; taxonomy, systematics and the diversity of life; Mendelian genetics; and evolution. This unit is only available to PDHPE students wishing to complete biology as a second teaching field.

Prerequisite

Year 12 Biology or equivalent strongly recommended

BIOL23000 Guided Studies in Biological Chemistry 6 cr pts

Offered only under special circumstances

This unit requires a significant amount of independent reading and research on a topic or topics in Biological Chemistry. The student will need to develop skills in information retrieval from library databases for written assignments and may be required to do some laboratory and problem-solving work.

Prerequisite

BIOL26100 Biochemistry

BIOL23100 Guided Studies in Biological Sciences 6 cr pts

Offered only under special circumstances

This unit requires a significant amount of independent reading

and research on a topic or topics in Biological Science. The student will need to develop skills in information retrieval from library databases for written assignments and may be required to do some laboratory and problem-solving work.

Prerequisites

BIOL16000 Biology I
BIOL16100 Comparative Functional Biology

BIOL23200 Guided Studies in Biology 6 cr pts

Offered only under special circumstances

This unit requires a significant amount of independent reading and research on a topic or topics in Biology. The student will need to develop skills in information retrieval from library databases for written assignments and may be required to do some laboratory and problem-solving work.

Prerequisites

BIOL16000 Biology I
BIOL16100 Comparative Functional Biology

BIOL26000 General Human Physiology 6 cr pts

This unit develops core concepts related to cell physiology and the functional control mechanisms related to each body system including nervous, musculoskeletal, cardiovascular, lymphatic, respiratory, renal, digestive, reproductive and endocrine systems.

Prerequisites

SCAP16200 Anatomy and Physiology *or*
BIOL16000 Biology I

BIOL26100 Biochemistry 6 cr pts

An introduction to the fundamentals of biochemistry. The student will be introduced to the fundamental classes of biochemical compounds and how such compounds contribute to cellular structure, energy generation and the storage and transmission of genetic information.

Prerequisite

BIOL16000 Biology I *and* one 100 level Chemistry

BIOL26200 Ecology 6 cr pts

This unit introduces ecology focusing on the interaction of organisms with their biological and physical environment. An understanding of populations, communities, ecosystems, life history strategies, succession and biogeochemical cycles is given special consideration. Particular emphasis is given to aquatic ecosystems. Scientific communication and writing skills are developed in an ecological context. Statistical techniques used in ecological studies are also explored.

Prerequisites

BIOL16000 Biology I *or*
BIOL16100 Comparative Functional Biology

BIOL26300 Mammalogy 6 cr pts

Mammalogy provides foundational knowledge of taxonomy, reproduction, ecology, behaviour, social structure and conservation in a mammalian context. Emphasis is placed on Australian mammals, especially marsupials. The unit engages students in relevant fieldwork, laboratory sessions

and scientific research techniques to prepare participants for employment in private or public organisations or to undertake further study at a postgraduate level.

Prerequisites

BIOL16000 Biology I *or*
BIOL16100 Comparative Functional Biology

BIOL26400 General Microbiology 6 cr pts

This unit introduces the student to the study of microorganisms. Attention is given to the history, scope and application of microbiology. The significant features of the microbial world, including the growth, cultivation, and control of microorganisms will be examined. The immunological response of the host to microorganisms is investigated. The role of microorganisms in the food industry and biotechnological applications of microorganisms in industry are explored.

Prerequisites

BIOL16000 Biology I

BIOL26600 Ecophysiology of Animals 6 cr pts

Even years

This unit examines the physiological adaptations of animals to the environment in which they live. It looks at the 'how' and 'why' questions of comparative animal physiology. Special emphasis is given to the mechanisms by which animals adjust to the adversities of extreme environments.

Prerequisites

BIOL16100 Comparative Functional Biology

BIOL26700 Histotechniques 6 cr pts

Odd years

A study of histopathology techniques including paraffin section processing and staining, cell chemistry, fixation and staining theory, frozen sections and special stains, all within a clinical framework and in the context of cellular structure and function.

Prerequisite

Two 100 level units

BIOL26800 Clinical Biochemistry 6 cr pts

Even years

A study of Clinical Biochemistry, ranging from introductory concepts (eg spectrophotometry, instrumentation, SI units) to significant coverage of liver function, renal function, carbohydrates, lipids, plasma proteins, non-protein nitrogen, and enzymology, from a clinical and laboratory perspective. Practical sessions will concentrate on familiarisation with laboratory practice and the case study approach.

BIOL26100 Biochemistry

BIOL36000 Investigative Biochemistry 6 cr pts

Odd years

A problem-based learning approach to the study of a variety of interesting and diverse biochemical areas. Topics will be selected for detailed investigation from the following: the

chemistry and biochemistry of the origin of cellular life on earth; the biochemistry of a number of disease conditions prevalent in western society such as diabetes, atherosclerosis and coronary heart disease; the systemic effects of smoking; diseases of the immune system such as AIDS; common genetic diseases; etc.

Prerequisite

BIOL26100 Biochemistry

BIOL36200 Plant Biology 6 cr pts

Odd years

The unit has two strands:

- 1 The taxonomy of Angiosperms, with particular reference to the Australian flora
- 2 Ecological plant physiology: the physiological basis for the interaction of the plant with its environment.

Prerequisite

BIOL26200 Ecology

BIOL36300 Mammalian Studies 6 cr pts

Mammalian studies provide foundational knowledge of taxonomy, reproduction, ecology, behaviour, social structure and conservation in a mammalian context. Emphasis is placed on Australian mammals, especially marsupials. The unit engages students in relevant fieldwork, laboratory sessions and scientific research techniques to prepare participants for employment in private or public organisations or to undertake further study at a post-graduate level.

Prerequisites

BIOL16000 Biology I *or*

BIOL16100 Comparative Functional Biology

BIOL36400 Advanced Human Physiology 6 cr pts

The physiology of the cardiovascular and respiratory systems. The blood, lymph, tissue fluids, their physico-neuroendocrine control mechanisms including an introduction to related disorders.

Prerequisite

BIOL26000 General Human Physiology

BIOL36500 Molecular Biology 6 cr pts

Even years

A study in major aspects of molecular biology with emphasis on the latest developments in recombinant DNA technology. Gene organisation and control are explored. Loss of control is also considered with specific reference to the molecular biology of cancer.

Prerequisite

BIOL26100 Biochemistry

BIOL36600 Conservation Ecology 6 cr pts

Even years

This unit examines the application of ecological principles to biological conservation especially to the management of marine and freshwater ecosystems.

Prerequisite

BIOL26200 Ecology

BIOL36700 Applied Ecology 6 cr pts

Even years

This unit examines the application of ecological principles to biological conservation and to the management of aquatic ecosystems.

Prerequisite

BIOL26200 Ecology

BIOL36800 Marine Biology 6 cr pts

This unit provides a detailed coverage of the physical, chemical and biological processes in Australian marine waters. Emphasis is given to ecosystem structure and function. In addition, human influences on the marine environment are outlined including pollution, fisheries and aquaculture.

Prerequisite

BIOL26200 Ecology

BIOL37000 Food Microbiology 6 cr pts

Offered, subject to staffing constraints

A study into the major aspects of food microbiology. Microbial contributions to food processing and the role played by microorganisms will be explored. The processes of food poisoning and food spoilage will also be examined.

Prerequisites

BIOL26100 Biochemistry

BIOL26400 General Microbiology

BIOL39000 Seminar in Biology 6 cr pts

Offered, subject to staffing and timetable constraints

This unit is designed to give the student the opportunity to research an area of their major discipline in depth under the supervision of a staff member of the Faculty of Science and Mathematics.

The student should recognise that he/she will need to be self-motivated, organised and willing to research into topics under his/her own initiative. Whilst adequate staff supervision and guidance will be important to student success, the student will need to take responsibility for the development and completion of the task within the time frame allocated. Independent work is encouraged, but regular liaison with the supervisor(s) for guidance and for updates on progress is also required. The topic for investigation will be selected in consultation with the supervising lecturer.

Prerequisite

Satisfactory completion of at least three 200- or 300-level Biology units

BSAD25100 Business Research Methods 6 cr pts

This unit introduces students to research methods. It is designed to enable students to identify organisational information needs, understand the principles of conducting research as well as developing practical knowledge and skills to carry out research projects. Assessment includes a research proposal.

BSTR38400 European Business Tour

This unit examines the effect of geographic location, political and economic environments, availability of resources and

infrastructure on international businesses. It also evaluates the national, state, ethnic and local cultural influences on business practice, processes, the values and ideals of employees and entrepreneurs. Students taking this unit will participate in a three-week tour through Singapore and Europe during which they will develop their observation, enquiry and analytical research skills.

CCBM21500 Screen Performance 6 cr pts

Even years from 2011

This unit assists students in developing skills for screen performance, and knowledge of acting theory, script analysis and single camera techniques. Students are given practical contexts to collaborate with other performers and creatively express themselves through the workshop and audition process. The journal component of this unit provides opportunities for students to engage in independent research, analysis, reflection, and evaluation.

Prerequisite

12 credit points in Communication units or 12 credit points in English units.

CCBM26500 Studies in Television/Video Production 6 cr pts

Students are introduced to the medium of television, its industry structure and socio-political influences. The unit also introduces and develops the technical and practical dimensions of video production, providing experience in video pre-production, production and post-production.

Prerequisites

CCCR11500 Writing for Media

CCCR16000 Media Interpretations

CCBM26600 Radio Production 6 cr pts

This unit introduces students to the radio broadcasting industry, radio broadcast practice and ethics and has a practical component in radio program production.

Prerequisite

CCCR11500 Writing for Media

CCBM38500 Advanced Video Production 6 cr pts

This unit provides exposure and training in the art of live multicamera video production for television. The unit introduces and develops the technical and visually creative dimensions of television program production.

Prerequisite

CCBM26500 Studies in TV/Video Production

CCCR11500 Writing for Media 6 cr pts

This unit assists communication students in developing writing skills for various media contexts. Students are introduced to basic concepts of punctuation, grammar, register, style and genre with a particular emphasis on print journalism.

CCCR16000 Media Interpretations 6 cr pts

This unit provides an introduction to the way in which meanings are generated and understood in a variety of media.

Screen studies will be the major focus, with introductory coverage of various print media, radio and advertising. Practical experience will be given in several areas.

CCCR26200 Issues and Concepts in Communication 6 cr pts

This unit addresses a range of issues and concepts in communication and media theory, with applications to the analysis of media texts. Special attention is given to the nature, production, exchange and interpretation of meanings, and to the interrelationships between society and the mass media.

Prerequisite

CCCR16000 Media Interpretations

CCCR34300 Christian Studies III—Ethics and Communication Law 6 cr pts

For Communication Specialisations/majors

An introduction to the study of ethics and a selection of contemporary social, political and cultural ethical issues of relevance to Christian communication professionals; and a study of Communication law and its application to the practice of Communication including copyright; defamation; and truth in advertising and marketing.

CCCR38000 Professional Internship 6 cr pts

This unit provides opportunities for students to enhance their professional development through structured workplace experience in the communication industry. The professional internship comprises two blocks of workplace experience: a two-week professional placement between semesters three and four, and a four-week placement between semesters five and six.

Prerequisite

At least 12 credit points of 100-level Communication

CCCR39500 Independent Topic—in Communication 6 cr pts

This unit gives students opportunity to apply the knowledge and skills acquired in their major studies to the design and production of a substantial communication project. The work will be supervised by a Communication lecturer.

CCPR26400 Photo-Journalism 6 cr pts

Module 1 is a study of the pictorial elements associated with and expressed through the photographic image. It includes photographic composition and design; camera and dark room techniques.

Module 2 covers the theory and practice of photo-journalism, including orientation to the photo-journalism industry, and study of the aesthetics and ethics of photo-journalism, news, feature and sports photography and an introduction to digital photography.

CCPR26800 Public Relations Practice 6 cr pts

This unit studies internal and external public relations concepts and practices for businesses and other organisations, with an emphasis on identification and analysis of their

publics, and design, execution and assessment of appropriate communication strategies.

Prerequisite

CCCR11500 Writing for Media

CCPR36000 Public Relations Event

Management

6 cr pts

This unit studies the professional approach and practice in conducting public relations campaigns, event management and fundraising for businesses and other organizations, with an emphasis on identification and analysis of their publics to design, execute and successfully conclude a public campaign, event management or fundraising project for the advancement of the organisation.

Prerequisite

CCPR26800 Public Relations Practice

CCCR11500 Writing for Media

CCWR21600 Print Journalism

6 cr pts

This unit introduces the theory and practice of journalism. It focuses on news and current affairs research and students apply theory to practice by writing a series of news articles. Through tutorials, workshops, group discussion and editorial meetings students develop an understanding of news and current affairs and the contemporary debates in journalism.

Prerequisites

CCWR26700 Writing for Broadcast Media (Radio)

6 cr pts

Odd years

This unit introduces students to policies, economics and practices of commercial and community radio, and develops practical skills in script writing.

CCWR31500 Creative Writing

6 cr pts

Even years from 2010

This unit assists students in extending creative skills in the areas of poetry and short story writing. Students are given practical workshops encouraging them to collaborate with other writers and creatively express themselves through the drafting, composing and editing process. The portfolio component of this unit provides opportunities for students to engage in independent and experimental writing with a view to publication.

Prerequisite

24 credit points in Communication units or 24 credit points in English units

CCWR36310 Advanced Journalism

6 cr pts

Odd years

Narrative non-fiction is about the way we tell real-life stories. It combines the craft of reportage with the techniques and writing abilities of a novelist. A combination of fidelity to the

truth and literary expression can raise this writing to an art form. We see examples in creative magazine articles as well as in a diverse array of books that include real-life crime stories, travel writing, history, memoir and biography. This unit covers all these forms, focussing on biography and travel writing in particular. It also explores a few key texts in detail, as well as a wide range of readings in a critical class environment. There is an emphasis on the student's own work in a series of exercises and major writing projects to cultivate an awareness of narrative non-fiction and its practice.

CCWR37500 Writing for Television/Video

6 cr pts

Even years

This unit introduces students to policies, economics and practices of commercial and public television broadcasting, and develops practical skills in script writing.

CHBR02300 Chemistry Bridging Course

6 cr pts

A one-week full-time introduction to the principles, theory and practice of Chemistry. Topics include: atomic structure, ionic and covalent compounds, solutions, units of measurement, states of matter, energy and temperature, and properties of matter.

CHEM13000 Physical and Inorganic Chemistry I

6 cr pts

This unit is an introduction to physical and inorganic chemistry and is designed to give the student a conceptual background in atomic and molecular structure, gas laws, diffusion, thermochemistry, acid-base equilibrium including buffer systems, reaction rates, redox chemistry, salts in aqueous solution, solubility equilibria and nuclear chemistry. The atomic/molecular view of matter is used as the overarching principle for explaining chemical behaviour.

This unit is designed for students coming to Avondale from the USA who need general education units as part of their degree level studies in the USA.

Prerequisite

High school Chemistry or approved bridging course

CHEM13100 Organic Chemistry I

6 cr pts

Two thirds of this unit is devoted to the chemistry of the simpler aliphatic and aromatic compounds and elementary spectroscopy. One third deals with biomolecules: carbohydrates, lipids, proteins, nucleic acids, vitamins and minerals.

This unit is designed for students coming to Avondale from the USA who need general education units as part of their degree level studies in the USA.

Prerequisite

High school Chemistry *or* approved bridging course

CHEM16000 Chemistry IA**6 cr pts**

This unit is an introduction to physical, theoretical, and inorganic chemistry and builds upon the chemistry studied in year 12 at high school. Laws related to a study of reaction equilibria, reaction kinetics, gases, periodicity, electronic structure and chemical bonding are explored. The chemistry of inorganic ions in solution is explored in relation to the laws of chemistry and an introduction to the role of theory and mathematics in the development of chemical ideas is given.

Prerequisite

Year 12 Chemistry or equivalent

CHEM16100 Chemistry IB**6 cr pts**

One third of this unit is devoted to physical chemistry and two thirds to organic chemistry. The emphasis in physical chemistry is on thermodynamics and colligative properties of liquids and in organic chemistry the emphasis is given to the chemistry of simple aliphatic and aromatic compounds with an orientation toward synthesis, reaction mechanisms and spectroscopy. An introduction to biological compounds.

Prerequisite

Year 12 Chemistry or equivalent

CHEM16300 General Chemistry**6 cr pts**

This is an introductory unit. The physical and inorganic component constitutes the major part of the unit with topics such as atomic and molecular structure, electronic structure, chemical bonding, the periodic table, gas laws, acid-base equilibria, solubility equilibria, simple redox reactions, rates and nuclear chemistry. The minor part of the unit deals with organic and biological chemistry, emphasising structure, properties and uses, rather than synthesis and mechanisms.

CHEM21000 Organic Chemistry**6 cr pts***Even years*

This unit gives a more advanced treatment than encountered in Chemistry IB. Spectroscopic methods of structure determination, including ^{13}C NMR. The following mechanisms of aliphatic and aromatic compounds: nucleophilic substitution at saturated carbon, elimination, electrophilic and free radical addition to $\text{C}=\text{C}$, nucleophilic reactions of $\text{C}=\text{O}$ and acid derivatives, electrophilic, nucleophilic and free radical aromatic substitution. This unit covers synthetic methods, particularly using carbanions and diazonium salts, and introduces tautomerism. The chemistry of synthetic polymers.

CHEM16100 Chemistry 1B

CHEM21500 Biomolecular Chemistry**6 cr pts***Even years*

This unit gives a more advanced treatment than encountered in Chemistry IB. The chemistry of lipids, terpenes, carbohydrates, amino acids and proteins, nucleic acids including photochemical and other changes, vitamins, alkaloids, biosynthesis and the role of nanotechnology in the chemistry of biomolecules is studied.

CHEM23100 Organic Chemistry II**6 cr pts**

Two thirds of this unit is devoted to the chemistry of the simpler aliphatic and aromatic compounds, reaction mechanisms and spectroscopy. One third deals with biomolecules: carbohydrates, lipids, proteins, nucleic acids vitamins and minerals.

Optional for students from the USA who need Organic Chemistry as part of their degree level studies in the USA, and who already have studied general chemistry.

CHEM25000 Guided Studies in Chemistry**6 cr pts***Offered only under special circumstances*

This unit requires a significant amount of independent reading and research on a topic or topics in Chemistry. The student will need to develop skills in information retrieval from library databases for written assignments and may be required to do some laboratory and problem-solving work.

CHEM26000 Physical and Inorganic Chemistry IA**6 cr pts***Odd years*

This unit develops the key ideas of quantum chemistry and chemical kinetics and shows how they assist in an understanding of the chemistry of the transition elements and isotopes. There is a focus on the bonding, symmetry, substitution reactions and electronic spectra of d-block coordination compounds.

MATH16000 Mathematics IA or

MATH16400 General Mathematics

CHEM26100 Physical and Inorganic Chemistry IIB**6 cr pts***Odd years*

This unit develops the key ideas of thermodynamics and shows how they assist in an understanding of the chemistry of groups IV, V and VI of the periodic table, phase and chemical

equilibria, and electrochemical phenomena.

Prerequisites

CHEM16000 Chemistry IA
CHEM16100 Chemistry IB
MATH16000 Mathematics IA *or*
MATH16400 General Mathematics

CHEM31000 Advanced Organic Chemistry 6 cr pts

Even years

This unit deals with the structure, synthesis and stereochemistry of alicyclic compounds and the mechanisms of a variety of molecular rearrangement reactions. Mass spectrometry is added to the spectroscopic methods used for structure determination. Structure/reactivity relationships are related to free energy changes. Aromatic chemistry is extended to polycyclic systems, non-benzenoid compounds and heterocyclic systems. The principles and mechanisms of organic photochemistry are introduced.

CHEM32500 Solid State Chemistry and Spectroscopy 6 cr pts

Odd years

This unit applies the quantum theory, thermodynamics, and symmetry principles studied at 200 level to IR spectroscopy, statistical thermodynamics and solid state chemistry. The emphasis in solid state chemistry is on the seven crystal systems and their Bravais lattices, the structure and properties of a variety of solid state inorganic compounds which are proving to be of importance in material science, metals and non-metals, conductors, semiconductors, and superconductors.

CHEM26100 Physical and Inorganic Chemistry IIB

CHEM32600 Environmental Chemistry 6 cr pts

Odd years

This unit applies the fundamental chemistry studied at the 100 and 200-levels to the chemistry of the earth's atmosphere, the hydrosphere, and the terrestrial environment. Equilibrium chemistry and kinetics are applied to the chemistry of gases in the atmosphere, metal complexation in the aqueous environment, and soil chemistry. The chemistry of colloids and surfaces is applied to the environment and the role of organic molecules as pollutants is examined.

CHEM26100 Physical and Inorganic Chemistry IIB

CHEM32700 Organometallic and Bioinorganic Chemistry 6 cr pts

Offered subject to staffing and timetable constraints

This unit applies one's knowledge of organic chemistry and coordination chemistry to a study of organometallic compounds; non-benzenoid aromatic compounds; and examines the role of metals in bioinorganic molecules.

Prerequisites

CHEM26000 Physical and Inorganic Chemistry IIA
CHEM26100 Physical and Inorganic Chemistry IIB

CHEM32800 Food Chemistry 6 cr pts

Offered subject to staffing and timetable constraints

This unit integrates the various branches of chemistry and biochemistry to enable students to understand and manage the chemical changes that occur in foods during processing and storage. The content of the course focuses especially on the nutritional, sensory and physical changes that take place in food during processing and storage. The course includes advanced methods of instrumental analysis.

Prerequisite

CHEM21500 Biomolecular Chemistry

CHEM39000 Seminar in Chemistry 6 cr pts

Offered, subject to staffing and timetable constraints

This unit is designed to give the student the opportunity to research an area of their major discipline in depth under the supervision of a staff member of the Faculty of Science and Mathematics.

The student should recognise that he/she will need to be self-motivated, organised and willing to research into topics under his/her own initiative. Whilst adequate staff supervision and guidance will be important to student success, the student will need to take responsibility for the development and completion of the task within the time frame allocated. Independent work is encouraged, but regular liaison with the supervisor(s) for guidance and for updates on progress is also required. The topic for investigation will be selected in consultation with the supervising lecturer.

Prerequisite

Satisfactory completion of at least three 200- or 300-level Chemistry units

CMIN10500 Children's Ministry in the Local Church 6 cr pts

This unit deals with the theology and practice of ministry to children in local churches, from birth to 14 years of age. It includes philosophy and methodology for discipleship, worship, evangelism, service and community. Students are required to understand children's unique needs, and be equipped to minister to them. Attention will be given to the connections to be made among generations and other ministries.

CMIN16000 Spiritual Formation for Pastoral Ministry 6 cr pts

This unit surveys different approaches to spirituality and self-awareness, and provides foundational spiritual preparation of the person for ministry. It examines the Biblical foundations for ministry in a context of a theology of the church and its mission, and introduces basic ministry skills and professional boundaries. A church placement is included in this unit.

CMIN16100 Communication and Worship 6 cr pts

This unit continues the spiritual preparation of the person for ministry. It introduces small groups theory, communication practice, and the theology and practice of worship. The latter includes a history of worship, the place of worship music, and contemporary worship styles.

CMIN16500 Youth Ministry in the Local Church 6 cr pts

A study of the theology and practice of youth ministry covering the need for a special ministry for youth; the organisation of youth ministry in the local church, and developmental theory from ages 10–30. Particular attention is paid to faith development. Study will be given to how youth learn, and to small group theory. The student will spend time learning to assess and program to meet youth needs.

CMIN16600 Christian Health: Philosophy and Practice 6 cr pts

This unit studies the philosophy and practice of health, particularly as it relates to Christian service. Special attention is given to the historical development and the scientific support of Adventist health beliefs, the determinants of health and theories of behaviour change, and the rationale and development of specific lifestyle programs.

CMIN21500 Ministry: Theory and Practice 6 cr pts

This unit comprises a study of the practice of ministry, giving special attention to local church leadership, management, and pastoral care in a congregational setting. It focuses on equipping students to be proficient pastoral practitioners.

CMIN21600 Evangelism: Theory and Practice A 6 cr pts

This unit comprises a study of personal evangelism as an aspect of the church's mission. It examines the building of integrated evangelism at the local level. A survey of the biblical basis for evangelism, its theology, and methods of personal evangelism are critically surveyed. Students are guided in developing and adapting evangelistic methods, skills, and strategies for future ministry.

CMIN26100 Worship Leadership in a Local Church 6 cr pts

This unit explores the issues of leadership and team ministry in the context of local church worship. A theology of Christian worship is developed, along with a practical approach to worship planning. Issues surrounding worship and culture are examined.

CMIN26500 Preaching in Ministry 6 cr pts

This unit is a study of the preparation and delivery of sermons in the context of current worship practice. Preaching practice in the classroom together with sermon presentations in local churches constitute the practical requirements.

Prerequisite

CMIN16100 Communication and Worship

CMIN28100 Evangelism in Practice A 6 cr pts

This unit comprises a study of personal evangelism as an aspect of the church's mission. After a survey of the Biblical basis for evangelism and its theology, methods of personal evangelism are critically surveyed, and students are guided in developing and adapting evangelistic methods and skills for their future ministry.

Prerequisite

CMIN16000 Spiritual Formation for Pastoral Ministry

CMIN28200 Australian and New Zealand Religions 6 cr pts

This unit comprises a study of the religious environment of Australia and New Zealand. Attention is given to indigenous religions, traditional Christianity, Christian cults and sects, and the other world religions presently active in the Australian/New Zealand context. Particular attention is given to a theology of cross-cultural ministry and mission, and Christian perspectives on sociology and cultural anthropology.

Prerequisite

Any CHMIN first-level unit

CMIN28300 Ministry in Practice A 6 cr pts

This unit comprises a study of the theology and practice of ministry, giving special attention to the personal work of the pastor, worship services, and strategies for church-based pastoral and evangelistic ministry in a supervised field context. It incorporates both classroom and supervised field components.

Prerequisite

CMIN16000 Spiritual Formation for Pastoral Ministry

CMIN38100 Evangelism in Practice B 6 cr pts

This unit is a study of the theory and practice of public evangelism and its integration into ministry in the Seventh-day Adventist Church. It includes assigned practical requirements which are fulfilled in the context of a local church program of evangelism. Additional practical requirements in a local congregation are also attached to this unit.

Prerequisite

CMIN26500 Preaching in Ministry

CMIN38300 Ministry in Practice B 6 cr pts

This unit comprises a further study of the theology and practice of ministry, with special attention being given to the leadership development of the pastor, as preparation for the transition from student to practitioner. It incorporates both classroom and supervised field components.

Prerequisite

CMIN28300 Ministry in Practice A

CMIN39500 Seminar in Philosophy of Adventist Ministry and Mission 6 cr pts

CMIN39500 is to be taken in the student's final year

This unit provides an opportunity for the student to examine the conceptual framework for the practice of ministry and mission in the Seventh-day Adventist Church. Emphasis

is given to the integration of sound philosophical and theological perspectives with strategies and methodologies in pastoral and evangelistic practice.

Prerequisite

CMIN28100 Evangelism in Practice A

CMIN46500 Homiletics 6 cr pts

This unit is a study of homiletical theory and practice in the context of contemporary worship. Preaching practice in the classroom together with sermon presentations in local churches constitute the practical requirements.

CMIN48100 Evangelism in Ministry I 6 cr pts

This unit comprises a study of personal evangelism as an aspect of the church's mission. After a survey of the Biblical basis for evangelism and its theology, methods of personal evangelism are critically surveyed, and students are guided in developing and adapting evangelistic methods and skills for their future ministry.

CMIN48200 Evangelism in Ministry II 6 cr pts

This unit is a study of the theory and practice of public evangelism and its integration into ministry in the Seventh-day Adventist Church. It includes assigned practical requirements which are fulfilled in the context of a local church program of evangelism. Additional practical requirements in a local congregation are also attached to this unit.

CMPS16000 Developmental and Pastoral Psychology 6 cr pts

This unit examines the interface between psychology and religion within the context of a Christian understanding of what it means to be human. Theories of human development and psychological functioning are investigated in their application to pastoral ministry and other human services.

CMPS36500 Marriage and Family Psychology 6 cr pts

This unit examines marriage and family psychology, giving particular attention to family systems theory within a Christian perspective. Included is a review of current research relating to the family life cycle, family influences on child and adolescent development, and religion and the family. Health and dysfunction provide the context for an investigation of systemic approaches to facilitating individual, couple, and family change. Understanding the influence of diversity issues is essential in this unit.

CMPS46600 Family Systems Theory 6 cr pts

This graduate-level unit involves a measure of autonomous exploration into current research on the family life cycle, on familial impacts on personal development, and on religion and the family. Family systems theory provides the major model for this exploration. The role of systemic approaches in precipitating change is especially emphasized. The focus is on health versus dysfunction in the framework of family diversity.

CMRN35000 Independent Topic in Church Ministry or Philosophy 6 cr pts

Guided reading and research on an issue/s or topic/s in Church Ministry or Psychology is undertaken in the unit. It may involve the preparation and submission of one or two papers (totalling 6,000 words) on a specific issue/s or topic/s related to the relevant literature, or a series of reading reports with associated discussion. It could be based on a small research project but is more likely to be an extended essay/s based on library/other sources research.

CSTD10400/CSTD20200 Spiritual Care in Health 6 cr pts

Assisting the clients to meet their spiritual needs is considered to be an important aspect of holistic caring. This unit addresses the concept of human spirituality. It explores differing belief systems and common problems of spiritual origin and suggests strategies by which knowledge of differing beliefs and the concept of spirituality combined with skilled nursing interventions and caring can assist in alleviating spiritual distress and facilitate wellbeing.

CSTD14300 Christian Studies I 6 cr pts

This unit focuses on the dynamics and experience of salvation, the spiritual message of the Bible and the implications for Christian belief and lifestyle response. The emphasis throughout is on relating the study of Christian faith to real life issues and the concerns of the student.

CSTD24300 Christian Studies II 6 cr pts

This unit examines what it means to be "Adventist" in the 21st century: our identity, our heritage, and our role in contemporary society and the future.

Recommended Prerequisites

CSTD14300 Christian Studies I, or

EDUC14300 Christian Studies for Teachers I

CSTD30400 Ethics and Professional Accountability 6 cr pts

This unit explores ethical issues faced by nurses and health workers with a focus on assisting students to develop an understanding of ethical principles and approaches used in moral decision making, and to consolidate their individual stance on ethical issues. Ethical problems are examined from various perspectives with particular emphasis being given to Christian principles, which guide moral decisions. Legislation and professional accountability in relation to ethical issues is also outlined.

DTDP10100 Design Principles and Practice (TAS) 6 cr pts

An introductory unit exploring the principles, process and practice of design through case studies and hands-on, conceptually-based design tasks which encourage personal and innovative graphic solutions with emphasis on design in the built environment. The traditional elements and principles of design are investigated through the study of historical and contemporary design trends, practices and

practitioners and the influence of appropriate technology, ethical and sustainability issues in design practice. Lateral thinking processes and techniques are utilised to assist with creative problem-solving strategies.

DTDP30100 Innovation and Sustainability in the Built Environment 6 cr pts

A study of the provision of buildings, their arrangement in relation to one another, to public facilities, transport systems, workplace and city structures; with a focus on aspects of housing choices as they affect the quality of individual and family life. Innovation and emerging technologies, the factors affecting design, environment and sustainability issues, and the work of designers are addressed.

DTDP30200 Design Project 6 cr pts

A self-directed project in which students will expand and consolidate ideas, techniques and concepts studied in textiles technology, industrial technology or graphics and multimedia technology.

Prerequisites

Normally a minimum of three semesters of the BEd Secondary Home Economics/Design and Technology specialisation *or* BEd Secondary Technology and Applied Studies specialisation

DTFN11100 Food, Nutrition and Health 6 cr pts

An investigative approach to the fundamentals of food composition, production, selection and preparation and a study of the function of food and nutrients for health promotion in humans.

DTFN21100 Food Production Systems 6 cr pts

A study of food production and service systems embracing design of facilities, menu planning, and selection, preparation, manufacture and distribution of food. Emphasis is given to safety, nutritional, aesthetic, cultural, technological, economic and legislative factors that influence food production and innovation.

Prerequisite

DTFN11100 Food, Nutrition and Health

DTFN21200 Food Science and Innovation 6 cr pts

A study of the physical, chemical and sensory properties of food commodities and their constituents, research methods and experimental design, with an emphasis on plant food commodities and the role of food science and emerging technologies in food product design and innovation.

Prerequisite

DTFN21100 Food Production Systems, or equivalent

DTFN29500 Guided Studies in Food and Nutrition 6 cr pts

This is a unit of guided reading and research investigating issues in food and nutrition. It could be a small research project but is more likely to involve essays based on library/ other sources research and may involve practical laboratory investigations.

DTFN31100 Food Industry Experience 6 cr pts

A food industry placement with a written and oral presentation based on the experience. A reflective learning journal is to be submitted. The student is expected to develop a range of workplace laboratory skills and/or computational skills, problem-solving skills, knowledge of occupational health and safety regulations intrinsic to the specific work assignment, workplace ethics, and personal skills that relate to promoting cooperative teamwork.

DTFN21200 Food Science and Innovation (or equivalent)

DTFN31200 Food Product Design Project 6 cr pts

A food product design and development project in which students will expand and consolidate ideas, techniques and concepts studied in the area of food science.

Prerequisite

DTFN21200 Food Science and Innovation, or equivalent

DTID30100 Electronics and Control Technologies 6 cr pts

This unit provides the theoretical knowledge and practical skills required to teach the electronics and control technology components of the Years 7–10 and the Stage 6 Industrial Technology syllabi. The emphasis is on an adequate conceptual base and also on the safe utilisation of industrial equipment and practice associated with the electronics industry.

DTTX12100.1 Designing with Textiles 6 cr pts

An application of the design process in the design and construction of garments using textiles and involving pattern making.

DTTX22100 Textiles and Fashion 6 cr pts

A study of history of costume in the 20th Century, the designers, socio-cultural aspects of clothing, and dress as a means of individual and group communication. Personal values, aesthetics, economic and technical factors involved in the selection and construction of textile articles as a form of self expression will be examined.

Methods of designing fashion garments using advanced drafting techniques including draping, are utilised, as are more complex construction techniques and specialty fabrics. These techniques are then applied to a major design project.

Prerequisite

DTTX12100 Designing with Textiles, or equivalent

DTTX22200 Creative Textiles 6 cr pts

A variety of fabric conventions and techniques such as screen printing, batik, shibori, silk painting, transfer printing, appliqué, texturing, incorporating photographic images and machine embroidery will be explored. The work of fibre artists will be researched and critically analysed in conjunction with personally selected subject matter.

DTTX22300 Creative Compositional Design 6 cr pts

There are two modules in the unit of equal weighting. Both must be passed in order to be awarded a successful grade in this unit.

Module 1—Photography (3 cr pts)

Photography is investigated as an expressive form of visual arts and graphic design practice. Special emphasis is given to pre- and post-camera manipulation as a means of exploring ideas, themes and issues through black and white photography.

Module 2—Creative Textiles (3 cr pts)

Techniques such as screen printing, batik, shibori, silk painting, transfer printing, appliqué, texturing, incorporating photographic images, and machine embroidery will be explored in conjunction with personally selected subject matter using a variety of fabrics.

DTTX32100 Textile Science and Innovation 6 cr pts

A study of the science and technology of textile fibres, dyes and finishes; textile standards, testing and quality assurance, product development and innovation, marketing and consumption patterns.

Prerequisite

DTTX12100 Designing with Textiles, or equivalent

ECON12200 Introduction to Economics 6 cr pts

This unit covers the concepts and problems of the economy as a whole including the issues of inflation, interest rates, exchange rates, and unemployment. Basic tools of macroeconomic analysis are developed.

EDCE11000 Integrated and Emergent Curriculum: Science and Technology 6 cr pts

This unit will present the early childhood curriculum as an Integrated and Emergent Curriculum. There will, however, be a special focus on the theory and practice of early childhood Science and Technology. The impact of developmental stages (0–2, 3–5 and 5–8 year olds) on learning in this unit will be emphasised and applied during in-semester teaching and observations. Teaching and evaluation strategies will be discussed to enable students to plan individual and group Science and Technology experiences.

EDCE12000 Integrated and Emergent Curriculum: The Arts I 6 cr pts

This unit will present the early childhood curriculum as an Integrated and Emergent Curriculum. However there will be a special focus on the theory and practice of young children's artistic and aesthetic development in Music and Dance. The impact of developmental stages (0–2, 3–5 and 5–8 year olds) on learning in this unit will be emphasised, and applied during in-semester teaching and observations. This unit will identify strategies for developing and enhancing artistic development and the role of adults in this process.

EDCE21500 Integrated and Emergent Curriculum: Numeracy and Technology 6 cr pts

This unit explores the pedagogical approaches to developing early mathematical and technological experiences and understandings for young children in early childhood environments. Students will explore numeracy, including the use of numbers and other mathematical concepts aimed at assisting children to develop skills in analysing and solving problems. Technology will be viewed as a tool, a medium for providing possibilities and opportunities, for children to make meaning and engage in relationships.

Teaching strategies and provisions will be explored, developed and critiqued in relation to curriculum framework recommendations. Theories of learning and intelligence will be considered in planning, teaching, learning and assessment practices. The impact of developmental stages (0–2 and 3–5 year olds) on learning in this unit will be emphasised, and applied during in-semester teaching and observations.

EDCE22000 Integrated and Emergent Curriculum: The Arts II 6 cr pts

This unit will present the early childhood curriculum as an Integrated and Emergent Curriculum. However there will be a special focus on the theory and practice of young children's artistic and aesthetic development in Visual Arts and Drama. This unit will identify strategies for developing and enhancing artistic development and the role of adults in this process. The impact of developmental stages (0–2, 3–5 and 5–8 year olds) on learning in this unit will be emphasised, and applied during in-semester teaching and observations.

EDCE23000 Integrated and Emergent Curriculum: Multiple Literacies 6 cr pts

This unit will present the early childhood curriculum as an Integrated and Emergent Curriculum. However there will be a special focus on the theory and practice associated with the development of 0–2, 3–5 and 5–8 year olds language, literature and literacy development across the developmental stages. It will incorporate a critical evaluation, from the Christian worldview, of a range of children's literature. Teaching and evaluation strategies will be discussed to enable students to plan individual and group literacy experiences.

EDCE24000 Integrated and Emergent Curriculum: PDHPE 6 cr pts

This unit will present the early childhood curriculum as an Integrated and Emergent Curriculum. However there will be a special focus on the theory and practice of early childhood PDHPE. The impact of developmental stages (0–2, 3–5 and 5–8 year olds) on learning in this unit will be emphasised, and applied during in-semester teaching and observations. Teaching and evaluation strategies will be discussed to enable students to plan individual and group PDHPE experiences.

EDCE25000 Integrated and Emergent Curriculum: Bible and HSIE **6 cr pts**

This unit provides a study of basic Biblical principles that enable young children to know God and experience a relationship with Him. It will incorporate the principles that guide the development of Biblical worldviews. Factors that establish and promote the integration of ‘Special Character’ in early childhood environments and specifically in HSIE experiences will be explored. A variety of teaching and learning strategies will be considered. Teachers will explore and critique selected Bible and HSIE Curriculum documents to plan appropriate learning experiences for young children. The value of play in the Bible and HSIE curriculum will be explored. The impact of developmental stages (0–2, 3–5 and 5–8 year olds) on learning in this unit will be emphasised, and applied during in-semester teaching and observations.

EDCP21500 Curriculum Studies—Creative Arts I **6 cr pts**

This unit is designed to develop both practical competence and teaching expertise in music and visual arts. Students will participate in the analysis and practice of the elements of music and visual arts in varying forms and contexts from a Christian perspective. Students will also investigate the creative development of children in their classwork and every day living.

EDCP21600 Curriculum Studies—Creative Arts II **6 cr pts**

This unit is designed to extend students’ practical competence, teaching expertise and analytical skills in music, drama and dance. The content includes the principles and methods involved in teaching music in the primary school.

Corequisites

EDCP21500 Curriculum Studies—Creative Arts I

EDCP21700 Curriculum Studies—Creative Arts (BTch) **6 cr pts**

This unit is designed to develop both practical competence and teaching expertise in music, visual arts, drama and dance. Students will participate in the analysis and practice, from a Christian perspective, of the elements of music, visual arts, drama and dance in varying forms and contexts. Students will also investigate the creative development of children in their classwork and every day living.

EDCP22500 Curriculum Studies—English I **6 cr pts**

The unit involves an in-depth analysis of literacy development across the curriculum in Years K–2. The various approaches and theories to initial reading, writing and spelling instruction will be examined in theory and practice. A Christian worldview will underpin all instruction and discussion.

EDCP22600 Curriculum Studies—English II **6 cr pts**

The unit involves an in-depth analysis of literacy development across the curriculum in Years 3–6. The various approaches and theories to listening and speaking, reading, writing and spelling instruction will be examined in theory and practice.

A Christian worldview will underpin all instruction and discussion.

Prerequisite

EDCP22500 Curriculum Studies—English I

EDCP23000 Curriculum Studies—Physical Education **6 cr pts**

This unit is designed to develop an understanding of physical education in the primary school. Through a program of lectures, demonstration lessons, peer teaching experiences, unit writing and sports coaching students should acquire knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary for effective teaching in primary school physical education.

EDCP23100 Curriculum Studies—Personal Development and Health **6 cr pts**

The philosophical assumption upon which this course is based is that a healthy lifestyle underpins the mental, physical, social and spiritual well being of the individual, the home and the community. This unit also deals with structures, strategies, skills and knowledge essential to the effective functioning of a caring and nurturing primary school community. This course is not designed as a ‘content-based’ course. Rather it is one that looks at the principles and practices of teaching in the context of this particular content area. The physical education section of the PDHPE syllabus will be covered in EDCP23000.

EDCP23200 Curriculum Studies—Personal Development, Health and Physical Education (BTch) **6 cr pts**

The philosophical assumption upon which this course is based is that a healthy lifestyle underpins the mental, physical, social and spiritual well being of the individual, the home and the community. This unit also deals with structures, strategies, skills and knowledge essential to the effective functioning of a caring and nurturing primary school community. This course is not designed as a ‘content-based’ course. Rather it is one that looks at the principles and practices of teaching in the context of this particular KLA.

EDCP27000 Curriculum Studies—Religion **6 cr pts**

This unit involves an in-depth analysis of literacy development across the curriculum in Years 3–6. The various approaches and theories to listening and speaking, reading, writing and spelling instruction will be examined in theory and practice. A Christian worldview will underpin all instruction and discussion and includes a study of the power of God’s word in the life of both teacher and student, spiritual growth and development of children, Christ’s methods of imparting truth, the impact of the environment on religious development, and a survey of the Bible texts and programming.

EDCP28300 Curriculum Studies—Science and Technology (BTch) **6 cr pts**

This unit reviews relevant science and technology syllabi (the NSW Education Department syllabus and those of the

Australian Union Conference of the Seventh-day Adventist Church) and examines strategies for teaching primary science and technology. The unit takes a constructivist approach and views primary science and technology as being essentially experiential in nature and therefore places emphasis upon practical activities and experiences and requires preservice teachers to participate in practical and laboratory activities. The unit also reviews a number of current issues relevant to the teaching of science and technology and requires that preservice teachers be conversant with current information technology. Because of the practical emphasis of the unit, safety is a central issue.

EDCP28500 Curriculum Studies—Human Society and Its Environment I 6 cr pts

This unit deals with selected strategies for teaching ‘Human Society and Its Environment’, one of the key learning areas of the NSW K–6 curriculum. The unit focuses on the student developing knowledge, understandings, skills, values and attitudes about people and their social and physical environments. The unit is presented within the framework of a Christian worldview.

EDCP28600 Curriculum Studies—Human Society and Its Environment II 6 cr pts

This unit deals specifically with the content and background knowledge required to teach Human Society and Its Environment, one of the key learning areas of the NSW K–6 curriculum. The unit focuses on the content of the strands Continuity and Change, Environments and Social Systems and Structures. The content of the strand Cultures is covered in EDUC29500 Multicultural Education. Students will also learn how to apply their content knowledge to meet the KLA outcomes, how to plan for effective learning, and in addition, explore the role of literacy as it relates to the teaching of Human Society and Its Environment. The unit is presented within the framework of a Christian worldview.

EDCP28800 Curriculum Studies—Science and Technology I 6 cr pts

This unit includes elementary content topics in technology, biology, chemistry, astronomy, earth science and physics. Its scope is broad rather than deep and it takes a constructivist perspective and presents primary science and technology as being essentially experiential in nature. As a result, practical activities take priority and will include the use of simple every day materials to develop coherent scientific concepts. Many of these activities will be reproducible in the primary classroom. Because of the prominence of practical activities, safety is an important issue.

EDCP28900 Curriculum Studies—Science and Technology II 6 cr pts

This unit reviews relevant science and technology syllabi (the NSW Education Department syllabus and those of the Australian Union Conference of the Seventh-day Adventist Church) and examines strategies for teaching primary science

and technology. The unit takes a constructivist approach that views primary science and technology as being essentially experiential in nature and therefore places emphasis upon practical activities and experiences which build basic concepts and skills. It perceives the teacher as a facilitator, motivator, organiser, instructor and manager of the learning environment. The unit also reviews a number of current issues relevant to the teaching of science and technology and requires that preservice teachers be conversant with current information technology. Because of the practical emphasis of the unit, safety remains a major issue.

EDCP29800 Curriculum Studies—Mathematics I 6 cr pts

This unit explores various pedagogical, learning and assessment approaches, strategies, and resources for teaching the content of the infant (K-2) school mathematics syllabus. Syllabus documents are overviewed in an attempt to re-conceptualise mathematics teaching and learning and how they are related to student development of mathematical concepts, skills and attitudes. Several theories of learning and intelligence are considered, with associated implications for teaching, learning, and assessment. The unit begins to uncover the interconnectedness of mathematical themes and topics within the structure of mathematics, allowing for better understanding of how to introduce a sound foundation for the learning of school mathematics to children aged up to 8 years.

EDCP29900 Curriculum Studies—Mathematics II 6 cr pts

This unit attempts to uncover the structured and integrated nature of K–6 primary school mathematics by illuminating the nexus between the teaching and learning of mathematics by the relations, recurring themes, and thinking processes emanating from the structural integrity of the mathematics itself. Syllabus documents (particularly those of NSW) are analysed and reviewed in an attempt to re-conceptualise mathematics teaching and learning and how they are related to student development of mathematical concepts, skills and attitudes. Several theories of learning and intelligence are considered, with associated implications for teaching, learning, and assessment.

EDCZ21300 Curriculum Studies—Food and Health 6 cr pts

This unit examines the aims and the philosophy of Nutrition and Health Education with the learning areas of Health and Personal Development, Food Technology and Mandatory Technology as taught in the various states of Australia and New Zealand with application of the curriculum development process for Years 7–12 in Seventh-day Adventist schools, State and other private secondary schools.

EDCZ21600 Curriculum Studies—Textile and Design (Years 7-12) 6 cr pts

This unit examines the aims and the philosophy of teaching textiles technology and design within the learning area of Technology and Applied Studies as taught in the various states of Australia and New Zealand with application of the

curriculum development process for Years 7–12 in Seventh-day Adventist schools, State and other private secondary schools.

EDCZ21800 Curriculum Studies—Commerce and Legal Studies 6 cr pts

Curriculum Studies—Commerce applies instructional research and teaching methodology to Commerce. The structure, content, outcomes, assessment and instructional designs of the NSW syllabus are examined. Students receive practical instruction in framing outcomes and planning, using various commerce teaching approaches, applying technology, selecting skills content, evaluating student work, integrating ethical values and faith within the classroom and the curriculum.

Curriculum Studies—Legal Studies is a study of the NSW Stage 6 Legal Studies curriculum and how it can be applied in the classroom. Planning skills are developed to enable the construction of programs or units of work in Legal Studies. Various methodologies used within the unit will be studied and applied.

Prerequisite

A business teaching major or minor

EDCZ23000 Independent Research in Curriculum Studies 6 cr pts

This is a unit of guided reading and research investigating issues in the curriculum of the selected discipline. It could be a small research project but is more likely to be an extended essay/s based on library/other sources research.

Prerequisite

Normally a minimum of three semesters of study in the relevant discipline or field.

EDCZ24000 Curriculum Studies—Biology 6 cr pts

The content and outcomes of the courses in Biology in the Australian states are examined with particular reference to the NSW Stage 6 syllabus. Specific teaching sequences, strategies and techniques are discussed and demonstrated. Professional attributes, resources, appropriate technologies and curriculum preparation and management are investigated.

Prerequisite

A major or minor in Biology

EDCZ24200 Curriculum Studies—Chemistry 6 cr pts

This unit will examine and apply a variety of curricula developments and pedagogical approaches for teaching chemistry. Programming, outcome mapping, assessment, chemical demonstrations, computers in chemistry and resources for HSC chemistry will be covered.

Prerequisite

A major or minor in Chemistry

EDCZ24400 Curriculum Studies—Physics 6 cr pts

This unit will involve a review of the physics syllabi from a selection of states but will place emphasis upon the content and intention of the NSW Stage 6 Physics syllabus and its associated assessment procedures. The unit will take a constructivist approach to the teaching of physics and will

emphasise the importance of student ‘hands-on’ experience; practical and theoretical problem solving; skills of diagnosis and remediation; instructional processes which foster reflective thought and conceptual change; and techniques of evaluation. Laboratory organisation and safety will also be an important component of the course. The unit will also require preservice teachers to commence the compilation of teaching resources.

Prerequisite

At least one 200 level Physics unit

EDCZ25100 Curriculum Studies—Computing 6 cr pts

Students study the NSW Stage 4–5 and 6 Computing Studies syllabuses and related research and pedagogy. This study includes a detailed analysis of curriculum content, classroom organisation, instructional methodology, teaching practices and skills.

EDCZ25400 Curriculum Studies—Junior Science 6 cr pts

The unit examines the nature of science and the role of science as a unit in the development of children. Students study the formation of aims, objectives and curriculum for science courses from year 7–10, the integration of Christian ideas and attitudes with science, and varied teaching strategies and styles basic to the presentation of science topics.

EDCZ25800 Curriculum Studies—Geography 6 cr pts

This unit focuses on the questions “What and how to teach?” in high school geography. It deals with the interpretation and implementation of the Geography Syllabi for NSW (Stages 4–5 and Stage 6)—these skills being applicable to the syllabi in other states. It includes the place of geography in human society and its environment; studies of society and environment; planning for outcomes assessment; and selection of resources for geography teaching. The question of values in geography teaching is discussed.

EDCZ26000 Curriculum Studies—Mathematics 6 cr pts

This unit reviews the range of options in Stages 4–6 of the NSW mathematics syllabi. An array of topics common to years 7–12 Mathematics in the various Australian states and New Zealand are reviewed and students are required to demonstrate and/or discuss a range of instructional and management techniques that apply to them. The unit includes aspects related to the determination of special needs among students and the development of appropriate instructional responses to those needs. Preservice teachers are required to demonstrate proficiency with appropriate computing and graphing devices. They are also required to create a unit of work and demonstrate the ability to create assessment activities consistent with those required by the Stage 6 General Mathematics syllabus. Finally students are required to commence the development of an array of resources that will be useful to their future teaching.

EDCZ26200 Curriculum Studies—History 6 cr pts

This unit applies educational research and teaching methodology to history. Students receive practical instruction in framing outcomes and planning; using history teaching approaches and various teaching methods; selecting skills content, and in assessing student work.

Prerequisite

A major or minor in history

EDCZ26400 Curriculum Studies—Religion 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to enable secondary teachers who choose to teach religious education to develop a theoretical perspective of religious education through a critical examination of a range of contrasting approaches. It also aims to develop skills in curriculum decision-making, planning, organisation and evaluation. Reflective classroom practice will be linked to pedagogical, psychological and learning theories.

Prerequisite

A major or minor in Religion

EDCZ26800 Curriculum Studies—Art and Design 6 cr pts

This unit applies teaching methodology to visual arts. Students receive practical instruction in examining the Creative Arts Key Learning Area and focuses on the NSW Visual Arts syllabus years 7–10. Special emphasis is given to developing a visual arts program of work and resources useful in teaching practice.

EDCZ26900 Curriculum Studies—Visual Arts 6 cr pts

Curriculum Studies—Visual Arts applies teaching methodology to the Creative Arts KLA, specifically Visual Arts. Students receive practical instruction in the NSW Visual Arts syllabus years 7–10. Students examine in detail the Stage 6 Visual Arts syllabus for Preliminary and HSC students as prescribed by the NSW Board of Studies. Correlation between assessment and outcomes is a significant part of these courses as individuals prepare themselves for reporting to students, parents and the Board of Studies. Special emphasis is given to developing a visual arts program of work and resources useful for teaching practice.

EDCZ27000 Curriculum Studies—Music 6 cr pts

There are two strands in this unit of equal weighting; Both strands must be passed in order to be awarded a successful grade in the unit.

Strand A focuses on teaching music in the junior secondary school. Students become familiar with the philosophy, rationale, aims, objectives and content of the NSW Board of Studies Music syllabus for years 7–10. Knowledge and skills relating to learning theories and class management acquired in other components of the BA/BTch degree will be discussed and extended, with specific implications to Years 7–10 mandatory and additional music courses. Special emphasis is placed on methodology, curriculum decision making, programming, teaching strategies, and assessment of learning outcomes.

Strand B focuses on teaching music in years 11–12; Preliminary and HSC) of the secondary school. Students become familiar with the philosophy, rationale, aims, objectives and content of the NSW 2 Unit Music 1, Music 2 and extension syllabi. Special emphasis is placed on curriculum decision-making, planning, teaching strategies, teaching resources, and assessment of learning outcomes (including consideration of the HSC examination). This strand also includes discussion of concert organisation in the school and the use of technology in music education.

Prerequisite

Strand B requires completion of Strand A

EDCZ27200 Curriculum Studies—English 6 cr pts

This unit requires a study of the role of English in the Australian secondary school classroom. The focus is on implementing the objectives and outcomes of the NSW Board of Studies English years 7–10 Syllabus and the English Stage 6 syllabus. Particular emphasis will be placed on the revised outcomes in the new English years 7–10 syllabus, including the mandatory types of text requirements. Through practical demonstration, example and experimentation, the students will be facilitated in mastering skills and knowledge that will assist them to synthesise these objectives and outcomes with those enunciated in the SPD Framework for Seventh-day Adventist education.

Prerequisite

An English major or minor

EDCZ27600 Curriculum Studies—Business Studies 6 cr pts

This unit applies instructional research and teaching methodology to business studies. The structure, content, outcomes, assessment and instructional design of the NSW Stage 4–6 syllabi are examined. Students receive practical instruction in framing outcomes and planning, using various commerce teaching approaches, applying technology, selecting skills content, evaluating student work, integrating ethical values and faith within the classroom and the curriculum.

EDCZ29300 Curriculum Studies—Design and Technology (Years 7-12) 6 cr pts

This unit examines the aims and the philosophy of the learning areas of Design and Technology as taught in the various states of Australia and New Zealand with application of the curriculum development process for Years 7–12 in Seventh-day Adventist schools, state and other private secondary schools.

EDCZ29400 Curriculum Studies—Technology and Applied Studies (Years 7-12) 6 cr pts

This unit examines the aims and the philosophy of a range of technology syllabi in the key learning area of Technology and Applied Studies as taught in the various states of Australia and New Zealand with application of the curriculum development process for years 7–12 in Seventh-day Adventist schools, state

and other private secondary schools, with emphasis on New South Wales syllabi.

EDCZ29500 Curriculum Studies—Food, Textiles and Family (HEc) (Years 7-12) 6 cr pts

This unit examines the aims and the philosophy of a range of Food Technology and Textiles technology syllabi in the key learning area of Technology and Applied Studies, and Community and Family Studies in the PDHPE key learning area, as taught in the various states of Australia and New Zealand with application of the curriculum development process for Years 7–12 in Seventh-day Adventist schools, state and other private secondary schools.

EDEP10000 Professional Development and Experience IA 6 cr pts

This unit introduces the student to the concept of the teacher as an ethical, reflective, analytical thinker, time manager and facilitator of children's learning who is able to meet the needs of individual children. Students will learn how to create lesson plans for play experiences. They will observe and evaluate children's play (0-2, 3-5 and 5-8). They will plan and set up the environment and materials for individual and small group experiences. The students will also become conversant with protocols in early childhood settings.

EDEP10100 Professional Development and Experience IB 6 cr pts

This unit will look at the basic principles of behaviour management. It will also develop competence in planning, setting up, conducting and evaluating experiences for whole group settings. This unit includes 10 days of professional experience in an early childhood setting (3-5 year olds). The students will also further develop an understanding of protective care, health and safety issues.

EDEP20000 Professional Development and Experience IIA 6 cr pts

This unit will define and analyse the concept of well-being in relation to self, children, families, the centre setting and the community. It will develop understanding of health and well-being from indigenous and diverse cultural perspectives. This unit includes 10 days of professional experience in a K-Year2 setting and 8 hours in a 0–3-year-old setting.

Corequisite:

EDEP10000 Professional Development and Experience IA

EDEP20100 Professional Development and Experience IIB 6 cr pts

This unit will explore relationships and connectedness between professionals, families, children and communities. Models of reflective practice and effective teaching will be developed. This unit includes 15 days of professional experience in a 0–2 early childhood service.

Corequisite:

EDEP10100 Professional Development and Experience IB

EDEP30000 Professional Development and Experience IIIA 6 cr pts

This unit will prepare preservice teachers to know their students and how they learn, plan, assess, and report and communicate effectively in a well managed K–2 classroom. It will also provide the teacher with a variety of teaching strategies to be used in different contexts with 5–8 year olds. This unit includes 10 days of professional experience in an early childhood setting (3–5 year olds), and working towards their professional experience in a 5–8 year old setting (K-2 in an infant school) as well as 1½ days In-semester experience at an infant school.

EDEP30100 Professional Development and Experience IIIB 6 cr pts

This unit prepares students to work in a K–2 classroom in a range of settings with a range of class structures. It also examines classroom management and the wide variation of learners styles and potential difficulties. This unit will examine the issues involved with children settling into a new culture and learning a new language. Students will be given practical opportunities to assist with teaching children in groups. The unit will also examine the issues involved with successful teaching of indigenous children. Issues dealing with occupational health and safety and emergency situations are also investigated. The reasons for grouping and how to plan, implement and assess individual and group progress will be covered. Students will be given an opportunity to implement group work based on the NSW syllabus documents. Students will participate in 20 days of professional experience in a K–2 setting.

EDEP35000 Professional Development and Experience IVA 6 cr pts

This unit deals with knowledge and understandings, skills, competencies, attitudes and values required by preservice primary teachers to be effective practitioners in the contemporary workplace and essential to the effective functioning of a caring and nurturing primary school community. Relevant legal issues will also be identified and discussed. A number of modules exist inside the unit and deal with employment opportunities and school issues, literacy/ numeracy requirements for teachers in the workplace, and practitioner based research. There will also be three weeks of Professional Experience in a K – Year 2 setting.

EDEP35100 Professional Development and Experience IVB 6 cr pts

This unit deals with knowledge and understandings, skills, competencies, attitudes and values required by preservice

This unit includes an extended professional experience component of 25 days at a selected infant school followed by a debrief session at College. Students will implement and present the findings from their practitioner-based research project that they conducted during their Extended Professional Experience and interviews for the state and private sector will occur.

EDHN42000 Research Methods I 6 cr pts

This unit consolidates and extends the student's knowledge and skill in research methodologies, literature search processes, criteria for the evaluation of research reports, the use of statistics, computer software in analysis, and preparation of a research proposal. The learning experience leads the student to plan and proceed towards development of a creative scholarly thesis investigating a specific educational research interest.

Prerequisites

Admission to the Bachelor of Education or Bachelor of BA/Bus/BSc/Bachelor of Teaching (Honours) degree is on the basis of evidence that the student has achieved, during the first two years of the course, an average pass rate of not less than 75% and at least a credit (commendable) average grade for professional experience.

EDHN42100 Research Methods II 6 cr pts

This unit consolidates and extends the student's knowledge and skill in research methodologies, literature search processes, criteria for the evaluation of research reports, the use of statistics, and computer software in analysis. Students will have completed a research proposal allowing investigation of a specific educational research interest.

Prerequisite

EDHN42200 Research Project IA 6 cr pts

This unit involves the student in significant progress toward completion of a scholarly research study in education in the form of a written thesis.

This unit provides knowledge and practice of some of the basic tactics of teaching, lesson design and specification of learning

outcomes. It involves preservice teachers observing in the classroom, participating in micro-teaching, and preparing for a ten day off-campus professional experience session in the following semester. The role and rights of teachers and pupils will be reviewed. It also emphasises the need to develop a code of ethical practice so as to implement the professional attributes that are expected of beginning teachers.

EDPP17100 Professional Development and Experience IB 6 cr pts

This unit introduces teacher education students to issues underpinning the role of education in contemporary society. Current research into effective teaching will be described in the context of national and international directions in education. This unit also provides knowledge and practice of some of the basic skills used in classroom teaching. The unit involves the student in observation of actual teaching and participation in micro-teaching. This unit is also designed to provide opportunities for career choice testing, with a two week Professional Experience component.

EDPP18000 Professional Development and Experience IA (BTch) 6 cr pts

This unit introduces teacher education students to issues underpinning the role of education in contemporary society. It also covers issues dealing with child development. Current research into effective teaching will be described in the context of national and international directions in education. The role and rights of teachers and pupils will be reviewed. This unit also provides knowledge and practice of administration skills needed in small schools. It involves preservice teachers observing in the classroom, participating in micro-teaching, and preparing for a ten day off-campus professional experience session in the following semester.

EDPP18100 Professional Development and Experience IB (BTch) 6 cr pts

This unit explores the current nature, purposes, and characteristics of educational assessment in the Australian setting. Dynamic and static conceptions of assessment are reviewed in an attempt to better articulate a range of approaches to assessment, and what it means for a student to be successful. Theoretical perspectives are linked to practical usage in educational environments. This unit also encourages preservice teachers to examine their skills in relation to beginning teaching competencies. A four week professional experience session will be incorporated in this unit to develop skills in teaching, particularly classroom management and instructional planning.

EDPP29100 Professional Development and Experience IIB (AssocDeg) 6 cr pts

This unit explores the importance of adapting curriculum programs and regular teaching plans to assist students with special needs. This unit also encourages the support teacher to examine their skills in relation to assisting the teacher and the student in meaningful learning experiences. A three week Professional Experience session as a teacher support person will be incorporated in this unit to develop skills in support teaching, focussing particularly on classroom management, assessment, evaluation and small group planning.

EDPP31700 Teaching Project 6 cr pts

This unit involves students in a structured independent minor research project. Students may choose one of three portals into their project. *Portal 1* covers the preparation of a research proposal and the writing of a detailed literature review and analysis of a specific and focussed topic. *Portal 2* covers the preparation of a research proposal and literature review, and the writing of a detailed paper on the implementation and evaluation of a minor school or classroom project. *Portal 3* covers the preparation of a research proposal and literature review, and the writing of a detailed paper on the development and evaluation of a teaching resource. The project is to be

selected on the basis of furthering personal and professional understanding of an educational topic and its overall practical and/theoretical usefulness.

Prerequisite

A minimum of one year's teaching experience.

EDPP37000 Professional Development and Experience IIIA 6 cr pts

This unit focuses on advanced management and instructional skills in the social environment of the classroom and of the wider school community. EDUC13500 Child Development I**6 cr pts**

This unit assists students in gaining a knowledge of major theories of child development, and related outlooks on play. Students gain a knowledge of the domains of child development as they relate to 3 to 5 year-olds. Students gain a knowledge in relating to parents, carers, professionals and community members. Theories, play, and domains are studied with critical awareness of current research, and from the perspective of a Christian worldview. Self awareness is fostered. Students will experiment with observation methods and become aware of issues of culture, gender and power.

EDUC14300 Christian Studies for Teachers I**6 cr pts**

This unit focuses on the dynamics and experience of salvation, the spiritual message of the Bible and the implications for Christian belief and lifestyle response. The emphasis throughout is on relating the study of Christian faith to real life issues and to the concerns of the student.

EDUC15600 Literacy in Education**6 cr pts**

This general education unit develops skills in communication and information management necessary for students embarking on a higher education course and a professional career in teaching. Students undertake two modules: one

each in communication and information management. Both modules must be passed in order to pass the unit. The communication component focuses on aspects of communication skills relevant to the writing of essays and various assignments, the classroom, as well as written and oral interactions in the professional and personal domain.

The information management components focus on skills in the application of word processing, presentation, spreadsheet, and database software. It will also focus on understanding and using information management techniques and strategies essential to effective written and verbal communication, as well as an examination of associated ethical and social issues.

EDUC15800 Literacy and Numeracy for Teachers**6 cr pts**

This unit deals with knowledge and understanding, skills, and competencies in literacy skills and numeracy required by preservice primary teachers to be effective practitioners in the contemporary workplace. Module one focuses on personal literacy skills of the teacher and will include a literacy mastery test. The second module focuses on personal numeracy skills of the preservice teacher and will include a numeracy mastery test.

EDUC16000 Curriculum in Early Childhood Education**6 cr pts**

This unit investigates curriculum frameworks from Australia and New Zealand. It discusses Christian networks, compares provisions and introduces guidelines. This unit also explores the integrated and emergent nature of early childhood curriculum. Curriculum frameworks in relation to partnership with parents and transitions are also investigated and established.

EDUC20600 Computers, Learning and Curriculum Theory**6 cr pts**

This unit introduces future teachers to the use of the computer in the classroom. The emphasis is on the use of the microcomputer as a tool to facilitate student learning and as a teacher productivity tool. Students are also introduced to curriculum theory and practice.

EDUC21600 Computers, Learning and Practitioner-based Research**6 cr pts**

This unit introduces future teachers to the use of the computer in the classroom. The emphasis is on the use of the microcomputer as a tool to facilitate student learning, as a teacher productivity tool, data management, information storage and retrieval in the school library.

Students are also introduced to the principles and process of practitioner-based research so that they will be able to plan and implement a research project within the classroom/school during their professional experience program. Attention is given to the structure, format, and writing of students' action research projects which, when completed, are shared and discussed in tutorial sessions.

EDUC22100 Children with Special Needs 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to examine the historical aspects of the management of children with special needs including relevant State, Federal and International legislation. It also examines the key relationships between teachers, young children, their families and the community that assist the development and inclusion of young children with special needs and abilities to function as members of an early childhood learning community. In particular this unit aims to provide preservice early childhood teachers with a range of strategies for planning appropriate environments and provisions to optimise learning experiences for the social, spiritual, and emotional wellbeing and inclusion of each child.

EDUC23500 Child Development II 6 cr pts

This unit critically examines current theories of development in 0–3 year olds. Implications for best practice are discussed informed by current research. The development of physical, emotional, cognitive/moral, and socio/cultural domains during infancy and toddlerhood are discussed with a focus on the children as language learners and communicators. Language development is viewed as an expression of the neural dimension of attachment. Classes are enriched by visits from parents from the community with children 0–3. Students observe/interact with the visiting parents and children.

EDUC24300 Christian Studies II 6 cr pts

This unit examines what it means to be ‘Adventist’ in the 21st century: our identity, our heritage, and our role in contemporary society and the future.

Recommended prerequisite

EDUC14300 Christian Studies for Teachers I

EDUC26000 Theories of Development and Learning 6 cr pts

This unit is divided into two modules: Patterns of Development and Theories of Learning.

Module 1—Patterns of Development

This unit presents the physical, cognitive, social, spiritual and personality changes experienced as a result of development from birth to early adulthood. Emphasis is placed on those elements of development that relate to the school years.

Module 2—Theories of Learning

This unit introduces those aspects of cognitive theory that have direct relevance for classroom practice. Topics include the nature of memory and recall, affect and motivation, attention and perception, concept formation, schema theory and the nature of ‘understanding’. In addition the unit examines behaviourism and the implications that cognitive theory has for reading, problem solving, communication and classroom instruction.

EDUC29500 Multicultural Education and Indigenous Studies 6 cr pts

This unit deals with schools as a multicultural community. Exposure to different cultures, the issues and implications of diversity, tolerance, prejudice and racism will be explored in

the context of a Christian classroom. Aboriginal and Maori culture will be studied and associated issues in education relating to indigenous Australians will be explored. The methods of and approaches to teaching English as a Second Language will also be examined.

EDUC30000 Individual Differences and the Atypical Child 6 cr pts

This unit examines approaches which can be used by teachers to assist with the inclusion of children with special needs in the regular classroom setting. Emphasis is placed on the development of positive attitudes towards the mainstreaming of students with special needs, as well as on the planning and implementation of appropriate educational programs for these students. In particular the unit aims to provide preservice teachers with a range of strategies which can be used to optimise the educational experiences and the social inclusion of the mainstreamed child.

EDUC30300 Sociological Perspectives 6 cr pts

The process of education will be examined from a variety of sociological perspectives. Students will investigate several significant ethical and philosophical issues that underpin our society. Students will also investigate a range of current social issues that directly impact their role as a teacher.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of 200 level Education units

EDUC32400 Issues in Educational Computing 6 cr pts

This unit examines the role of computers in schools and particularly the school classroom. Students critically analyse and reflect on many issues involved in using the computer as both a productivity and learning tool in the classroom.

EDUC32600 Music Education 6 cr pts

This unit focuses on advanced curriculum and administration skills relevant to the teaching of music in secondary schools. There is a continuing emphasis placed on planning, teaching strategies, multi-cultural diversity, teaching resources and the administration of choral and/or orchestra and/or concert band programs. The unit also includes discussion of concert organisation, interaction with parents and administration and advanced use of technology in music education.

Prerequisite

EDCS27100 or its equivalent

EDUC34300 Christian Studies III—Philosophy of Christian Education 6 cr pts

A consideration of selected philosophies and related issues relevant to Christians in the teaching ministry. This unit emphasises the practical implications of adopting a Christian educational philosophy, particularly in church schools.

Students may not take both EDUC34300 and EDUC34600

EDUC34400 Art Education 6 cr pts

This unit examines the balance of art and technology in human effort, and emphasises a concern for the sensory, felt or perceived dimension in the curriculum. Particular focus

is given to the mass media, and power to manipulate social perspective and value formation.

EDUC34800 Teaching English as a Second or Other Language 6 cr pts

This unit gives a comprehensive introduction to the profession of teaching English to speakers of other languages. The content represents a balance between providing background information and relevant research, on the one hand, and offering classroom suggestions and resources for teachers, on the other. This unit incorporates knowledge of past and present teaching approaches, background on and techniques for teaching the language skills, various options for integrating the skills, theories of second language acquisition, and awareness of important learner variables. The aim is to provide the preservice teacher with a sound basis from which they can operate in order to design and implement appropriate classroom approaches and techniques.

EDUC34900 TESOL Practicum 6 cr pts

During professional experience, skill acquisition is enhanced through guided self-reflection and feedback from supervising teachers. Such skills will directly impact on the professional effectiveness of the prospective teacher. Students are required to fulfil specific criteria such as observing regular teachers as they practise, writing observation reports and teaching a series of lessons. This unit meets the NEAS (National ELICOS Accreditation Scheme) requirements for a TESOL practicum.

Prerequisite

EDUC34800 Teaching English as a Second or Other Language or an equivalent unit.

EDUC35300 Reading Behaviour and Disability 6 cr pts

This unit, designed for infants and primary teachers, covers the nature and causes of mild to severe reading disability. It aims to give preservice teachers competence in the diagnosis, management and treatment of such difficulties, with emphasis on direct, practical experience.

Prerequisites

EDCP22500 Curriculum Studies—English I
EDCP22600 Curriculum Studies—English II

EDUC35500 Languages other than English—Introduction to French 6 cr pts

An appreciation, understanding and awareness of French language and culture. Strategies for supporting and reinforcing the primary school LOTE program.

EDUC35600 Seminar in Education 6 cr pts

This is a unit of guided reading and research on issues and themes in Education. The unit involves the preparation and submission of one or two papers (totaling 6,000 words) on a specific theme or issue related to the research literature. It could be based on a small research project but is more likely to be an extended essay/s based on library/other sources research.

Prerequisite

Normally a minimum of four semesters of studies in Education.

EDUC37400 Planning Assessment and Evaluation 6 cr pts

This unit will investigate the principles of the planning, assessment and reporting cycle in the early childhood setting (0–2, 3–5 and 5–8). It will explore the nature of early childhood experiences and how these should be taken into consideration when planning. Assessment and reporting in general will be explored and the process for assessing and reporting in specific areas will be discussed. Planning for the children's transition to school will also be covered. This planning will be applied during the Extended Professional Experience.

EDUC37500 Science in Education 6 cr pts

This unit discusses the nature of scientific thought and the role that science has played in the development of society. The techniques of science are demonstrated from historical developments in the disciplines of physics, chemistry and biology. The current and future role of science in the technosociety is also investigated.

EDUC38300 Leadership and Advocacy 6 cr pts

This unit deals with the styles and practice of leadership, communication and interpersonal skills and conflict resolution. Ethics and ethical relationships will be included in this unit. The notion of partnership with parents in early childhood services will be discussed. The role of the leader as an advocate for children, families, and professionals will also be explored. The political aspects of leadership will also be dealt with in this unit.

EDUC39500 Health and Adolescence 6 cr pts

A study of trends in adolescent health emphasising research and evaluation of health promotion strategies particularly related to adolescent drug and alcohol use and risk taking behaviour.

EDUC39600 Health Promotion in Adolescence 6 cr pts

A study of adolescent health issues emphasising research and evaluation of health promotion approaches, and strategies particularly related to adolescent food intake, physical activity, drug and alcohol use and risk taking behaviour.

Prerequisites

EDUC26000 Theories of Development and Learning
EDUC29500 Multicultural Education and Indigenous Studies

Recommended

HPFH30300 Contemporary Family and Adolescent Health Issues

EDUC39700 Leadership Administration and Management**6 cr pts**

This unit addresses the styles and practice of leadership, communication, interpersonal skills and conflict resolution. Ethics and ethical relationships will be included in this unit as well as the political aspects of leadership. The notion of partnership with parents in early childhood services will be discussed. The role of the leader as an advocate for children, families, and professionals will also be explored. This unit also examines the issues, theory and practice of management in early childhood contexts. It will cover the initiation and implementation of change. This unit will also investigate impacts of government policy, guidelines and regulations on early childhood and the professional considerations that they engender, ie accreditation, curriculum framework document, child protection and risk assessment. The theory and principles learned in this unit will be put into practice during in-semester school visits and also during the Extended Professional Experience in the following year.

ENGL11000 Approaches to Literature**6 cr pts**

This unit introduces a variety of approaches to the study of drama, narrative and poetry. Students will be introduced to basic literary theory. Attention will be given to a range of key issues and concepts relevant to the study of literature in general. Students will survey a range of texts from a variety of critical perspectives.

ENGL12000 Australian Literature**6 cr pts**

This unit introduces students to Australian literary history, the work of selected Australian writers, and the problems inherent in the concept of a national literature.

ENGL21000 The Bible as Literature**6 cr pts***Even years*

A study of the literary dimensions of the Bible, especially exploring genre characteristics and their relationship to themes and message.

Prerequisite

At least six credit points of English at 100 level recommended. This unit is not available to students completing or who have completed ENGL25000 The Bible as Literature—Distance Education.

ENGL22000 Drama**6 cr pts***Even years*

A study of drama as genre with reference to text and performance. Attention is given to themes, techniques and dramatic qualities and production aspects of plays studied. The relationship between actor and audience, the influence of theatrical traditions and the evolution of performance styles will be explored through practical workshops. Participating in a major theatre practicum will form the basis of the bulk of assessment for this course.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of 100-level English or 100-level communication

ENGL23000 Comparative Literature**6 cr pts**

This unit focuses on literature across national and language boundaries. It explores the ways in which texts from different traditions raise questions about the nature and function of literature, paying particular attention to the transformation of texts and the comparative treatment of themes in relation to national, social and/or cultural contexts.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of English at 100-level.

ENGL24000 Writing Women**6 cr pts**

A study in narrative with emphasis on gender in literary discourse. Some of the areas covered include writing as a gendered activity, the concept of the heroine and the voice of female narrators and characters.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of 100-level English

ENGL25000 Literature and Religion**6 cr pts***Odd years*

This unit focuses on the treatment and development of the religious expression of dominant world religions in literary works. Attention will be given to the relationship between literature and faith experience. It will provide opportunity for the critique of the ways in which religious thought and related historical, sociological and philosophical concerns are expressed through literary texts.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of 100-level English

ENGL26000 Fiction for Children and Adolescents**6 cr pts**

This unit presents a critical introduction to some major historical and generic developments in novels for children and 'young adults' and explores the theoretical issues involved in the study of children's literature.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of 100-level English

ENGL29000 Guided Studies in English**6 cr pts**

This is a unit of guided reading and research investigating issues in English. It could be a small research project but is more likely to involve essays based on library/other sources research and may involve practical laboratory investigations.

ENGL31000 Post-Colonial Literature**6 cr pts**

This unit explores a range of post-colonial issues through a study of post-colonial literature in English. It is intended to help students interrogate eurocentric biases and develop a critical awareness of oppositional and national discourses. The nature of post-colonial theory will form the basis of evaluating the achievements and the discontentment within the field of post-colonial literature.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of 200-level English

ENGL32000 Life Writing 6 cr pts

This unit examines a range of autobiographical and biographical texts from English-speaking cultures in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. It also will explore some of the ways in which identities are discovered or made, and will analyse the representation of these processes in literary texts.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of 100-level English

ENGL33000 Renaissance Literature 6 cr pts

This unit explores some of the major writers of the English Renaissance in relation to cultural changes occurring in that period. Special attention is given to Shakespeare.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of 200-level English

ENGL34000 Twentieth Century Literature 6 cr pts

This unit examines a selection of the central literary preoccupations and experimentations of the period. It contextualises and questions the relationship between 'modernism', 'postmodernism', literary theory, and other social practices.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of 200-level English

ENGL35000 Literature and Religion 6 cr pts

This unit explores the concept of spirituality and its related issues through the study of literary texts. Attention is given to the interface of religion and literature and its appeal to the formation, understanding and critique of spirituality. The study will focus on texts both as conscious and unconscious formations. Particular attention is given to the way in which texts enable a critique of suppressed values and anxieties, shaped by and dominated within religious settings. The course will enable intertextual readings, wherever possible and encourage comparative methods of research and analysis.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of 200-level English

ENGL39000 Independent Topic—English 6 cr pts

This is a unit of guided reading and research on an issue(s) or topic(s) in the student's chosen discipline. It may involve the preparation and submission of one or two papers (totalling 6,000 words) on a specific issue(s) or topic(s) related to the relevant literature, or a series of reading reports with associated discussion. It could be based on a small research project but is more likely to be an extended essay(s) based on library/other sources research.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of 200-level English, with credit average

FNCE20000 Business Finance 6 cr pts

As business decisions usually have financial implications, this unit attempts to provide graduates with the finance skills necessary to rationally assess the choices facing professional business people

This unit is designed to introduce and provide a basic knowledge of financial decision-making. It introduces appropriate analytical techniques so that the financing and investment policies of the firm may be correctly evaluated in keeping with the objective of maximising shareholder wealth.

Prerequisite

MATH16300 Business Statistics

GEOH11000 Global Issues and Humanitarian Responses 6 cr pts

This unit examines the geographical dimensions of selected socio-economic and cultural issues of global concern, including: population dynamics; food production and hunger; culture and conflict; inequalities; human impact on the environment; development. Humanitarian responses to such issues are an embedded theme.

GEOH12000 Environmental Issues 6 cr pts

This unit deals with humans' relationships with and role in the physical environment, and includes an examination of issues such as forest clearance, land degradation, biodiversity loss, and pollution of waters and atmosphere, including acid precipitation, ozone depletion and the enhanced greenhouse effect. The links between economic development and environmental impacts are investigated, together with economic approaches to environmental preservation and conservation.

GEOH23000 Asia Pacific in the Global Economy 6 cr pts

This unit is a geographical study of the development of Asia/Pacific nations in the context of a global economy. Patterns of development and change are examined thematically across the region through a series of case-studies, including India, China and a selection of Pacific island nations.

Prerequisite

GEOH11000 Global Issues and Humanitarian Responses

GEOH29500 Guided Studies in Geography 6 cr pts

This is a unit of guided reading and research investigating issues in Geography. It could be a small research project but is more likely to involve essays based on library/other sources research and may involve practical laboratory investigations.

GEOH35000 Development Geography 6 cr pts

This unit examines the contested notion of development as it has been conceptualised and practised in the 'poor world': models of development; the international structures of colonialism, aid and debt; development institutions and their policies for poverty alleviation; the impacts of this 'top-down' development on rural communities and gender relations. Appropriate transformations and sustainability are underlying themes.

Prerequisite

GEOH23000 Asia Pacific in the Global Economy

GEOH36000 Urban Places and Society 6 cr pts

This unit examines the way human activity and experience are structured in urban space and various approaches to managing urban socio-spatial change. The focus is on exclusion, consumption, fragmentation and conflict in the urban environment. A range of theoretical perspectives is utilised and case studies are taken from Australia, and the developed and developing worlds.

Prerequisite

GEOH23000 Asia Pacific in the Global Economy

GEOH37000 Independent Topic in Human Geography 6 cr pts

This is a unit of guided reading and research *or* field research on an issue or topic in human geography. It involves the negotiation, preparation and submission of a 5,000 word paper on a specific issue, topic, case study or field of inquiry.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of 200-level Geography, with a minimum credit average

GEOP21000 Physical Geography A 6 cr pts

This unit considers the structure of the earth and the processes which shape the features of the crust. These include plate tectonics and related endogenic processes, and gradational processes acting on the surface.

Prerequisite

GEOH12000 Environmental Issues *or* approval of the Dean of the Faculty of Arts

GEOP22000 Physical Geography B 6 cr pts

This unit investigates the processes which operate in the atmosphere (both in the short- and long-term), the nature of soils and their formative processes, and introduces aspects of the distribution of life on the earth.

Prerequisite

GEOH12000 Environmental Issues *or* approval of the Dean of the Faculty of Arts

GEOP33000 Biogeography 6 cr pts

A study of the factors, both contemporary and historical, determining the distribution of biological organisms. The geography of species, dispersal, biogeographic regions, biogeographic history. A biogeographical account of the flora and fauna of Australia.

Prerequisites

GEOP21000 Physical Geography A
GEOP22000 Physical Geography B *or*
BIOL262000 Ecology

GEOP34000 Independent Topic in Physical Geography 6 cr pts

This is a unit of guided reading and research on an issue/s or topic(s) in physical geography. It may involve the preparation and submission of one or two papers (totalling 6,000 words) on a specific issue(s) or topic(s) related to the relevant literature, or a series of reading reports with associated discussion. It could

be based on a small research project but is more likely to be an extended essay(s) based on library/other sources research.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points at 200-level Geography, and credit average

GETR24000 Asian Fieldwork 6 cr pts*Subject to student enrolment*

This unit involves writing a 5,000 word report on an in-country study tour or immersion experience in at least one Asian country. It is expected that students will undertake negotiated fieldwork research, observations and activities relating to specific geographic features, places, spaces and processes. While a development geography focus is a theme of this unit, students may research areas as diverse as poverty, urban environments, pollution, deforestation, and change in values, lifestyle and land use.

Prerequisite

GEOH11000 Global Issues and Humanitarian Responses

GSCR08100 Christian World View and Contemporary Life 6 cr pts

This unit aims, from the perspective of Christian faith, to increase students' awareness of their own worldview and respect for the worldviews of others.

GSFS05000 Foundation English 6 cr pts

This unit is a general education unit, providing opportunity for students to develop the formal communication skills needed for tertiary study. The main focus is writing, including the preparation and presentation of a reading research essay. This is supported by an emphasis on critical thinking. Students are given opportunity to increase their understanding of significant human issues by thinking and writing about them.

GSFS06600 English Language Skills 6 cr pts

This is a course in English for academic purposes. The unit provides opportunity for students from a non-English speaking background (NESB) and native English speakers with a communication skills deficit to improve their English language competency.

GSFS06700 Academic Skills 6 cr pts

This unit looks at aspects of learning, particularly metacognition and study skills, and assists students in managing a study program. It also enables them to develop the keyboarding and word processing skills needed for further study at Avondale College. Personalised tutoring assistance, designed to provide general academic support, is incorporated into the program.

HEPS11900 Introductory Psychology and Sociology 6 cr pts

This unit provides an introduction to psychology and sociology. Psychological topics addressed include: brain and behaviour, development, sensation, perception, conditioning

and learning, memory, motivation and emotion, stress and coping, and social behaviour. Sociology concepts include class, ethnicity, society, socially patterned behaviours, current issues and concerns in Australian society.

HESC14700 Health Science I 6 cr pts

This unit introduces students to chemical concepts relevant to the nursing/health science context. The emphasis is on the role of biological molecules in body chemistry. The unit also introduces students to the importance of microbiology in understanding disease and the immune system.

HESC14800 Health Science II 6 cr pts

This unit is an introduction to basic applied human anatomy and physiology of all body systems. The major anatomical structures and functional relationships of the normal human body and an introduction to basic cytology and the chemistry of life are covered.

HESC14900 Health Science III 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to develop the student's knowledge and understanding of the application to nursing practice and health care of scientific developments. Developments in information and communication technology, diagnostic therapies and pharmaco-therapeutics will be explored to facilitate a knowledge base for clinical practice.

HIST16100 A History of Western Civilisation I 6 cr pts

This unit is a survey of western civilisation from antiquity to the end of the sixteenth century. Although the course surveys more than two thousand years of history, a number of themes and issues will be considered in greater depth. Primary documents will be studied, and there will be an emphasis on the cultural, religious and political factors which shaped western history.

NOTE: This is an elective unit only; it cannot be included as part of a major or minor

HIST16200 A History of Western Civilisation II 6 cr pts

A survey of civilisation in the west from the beginning of European expansion to the end of the twentieth century. This course will study the European Powers as they emerged from the Reformation; the development of absolutism and responses to it. It will consider the dynamics of revolutionary ideas and events in the late eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, including the industrial revolution, and the causes and consequences of twentieth century wars.

NOTE: This is an elective unit only; it cannot be included as part of a major or minor

HIST16300 Australia: Prehistory to the Present 6 cr pts

This unit is a survey of the history of Australia from earliest European exploration to the modern era, with particular emphasis on early settlement.

HIST16400 The Ancient World 6 cr pts

This unit is an introduction to the civilisations of the ancient Mediterranean. It will survey the history of Egypt, Greece and Rome, and will consider selected topics in detail.

HIST22500 Guided Studies in History 6 cr pts

This is a unit of guided reading and research investigating issues in History. It could be a small research project but is more likely to involve essays based on library/other sources research and may involve practical laboratory investigations.

HIST26100 Conflict in the Twentieth Century 6 cr pts

A study of conflicts which have shaped the twentieth century, beginning with the Russo-Japanese War. Particular attention will be given to the causes, conduct and consequences of the world wars.

Prerequisites

Six credit points of History at 100-level recommended.

HIST26200 Revolution and Revolutionaries 6 cr pts

This unit will study the phenomenon of revolution, and the background and events of a variety of revolutions from the seventeenth century to the present. There will be a focus on issues of change and upheaval, and those of continuity, in political, social, economic and religious areas. The role of individuals as leaders and participants will also be considered. There will be generalised discussion of revolutions and revolutionaries, and a deeper focus on the English Revolution of the seventeenth century, the French Revolution, the Russian Revolution, the Nazi Revolution, the Iranian Revolution and the Cuban Revolution.

Prerequisites

Six credit points of 100-level History

HIST26500 The Reformation 6 cr pts

A study of European and English history in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries as it relates to the Protestant Reformation.

Prerequisites

Six credit points of 100-level History *or* Enrolment in BTh

HIST26800 Australian Religious History 6 cr pts

Even years

A study of selected features of the Churches and Society in Australia 1788–1990.

Prerequisite

Six credit points of 100-level History

HIST27500 Ancient History Study Tour 6 cr pts

A study of significant sites in a selected area or areas of ancient history. Tours may be taken to the Middle East, Asia Minor and Europe. The unit includes pre-tour class work and post-tour assessment tasks.

HIST27600 Modern History Study Tour 6 cr pts

A study of significant sites in a selected area or areas of modern history. Tours will usually be taken to Europe. The unit includes pre-tour class work and post-tour assessment tasks.

HIST36600 Old Empires/New Nations 6 cr pts*Odd years*

An exploration of the concepts of imperialism and nationalism over the centuries, with particular emphasis on global empires and their collapse into national states in the twentieth century. Case studies will be selected from Palestine, Vietnam, Indonesia, India, and the Soviet Union.

Prerequisite

Six credit points of 200-level History or Geography

HIST36700 Women's History 6 cr pts*Even years*

This unit surveys women's history from the time of the early Christian Church to the end of the seventeenth century. It considers in depth a variety of topics such as representations of women; the creation of gender identity; work, marriage, domesticity, property, and family; religious and political structures, and women's relationships with power and authority. Wherever possible the focus will be on women's experience and their own voices.

Prerequisite

Six credit points of 100-level History

HIST36900 Issues in Representation: History, Literature and Media 6 cr pts

A study of the nature of representation in literature, media and history. Questions will be asked about the relationship between representation and notions of truth, factuality and reality, and the relative effectiveness of literature, media and history as mediums for such concepts.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of History, English or Communication

HIST37000 Themes in American History 6 cr pts

This unit is structured around five themes in United States history. These themes are: (1) political structures and developments; (2) the relationship of the United States to the rest of the world; (3) religion, reform and social upheaval; (4) marginalised groups: native Americans, black Americans, immigrant groups and women; and (5) presidential style and achievement.

Prerequisite

Six credit points of 200-level History

HIST39500 Independent Topic in History 6 cr pts

This is a unit of guided reading and research on an issue/s or topic/s in the student's chosen discipline. It may involve the preparation and submission of one or two papers (totalling 6,000 words) on a specific issue(s) or topic(s) related to the relevant literature, or a series of reading reports with associated discussion. It could be based on a small research

project but is more likely to be an extended essay(s) based on library/other sources research.

HPFH20100 Nutrition Development and Performance 6 cr pts

A study of the role of nutrients and psychosocial factors in human nutrition during the lifespan with a focus on exercise and cognitive performance.

Prerequisite

DTFN11100 Food Nutrition and Health, *or*

HPPD10300 Fitness, Food and Health, or equivalent

HPFH20300 Family and Community Studies 6 cr pts

A study utilising an ecological framework to examine how the well-being of individuals, families and communities is affected by broader societal influences at each stage of the lifecycle, with a focus on resource management.

HPFH30300 Contemporary Family and Adolescent Health Issues 6 cr pts

The study and application of crisis intervention strategies enabling the student to identify and utilise supportive networks for meeting the more challenging family life and adolescent health situations within contemporary society.

HPFH36300 Health Promotion 6 cr pts

The study of cultural meanings of health, the context of health promotion, and rationales and strategies for designing, implementing and evaluating health promotion initiatives particularly related to food and physical activity.

Prerequisite

HPFH20100 Nutrition Development and Performance, or equivalent

HPPD10100 Physical Education Studies—Team Sports 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to develop knowledge and understanding of game play with particular emphasis on strategic and tactical aspects of games. Students will be exposed to the game sense approach to teaching sports as well as traditional sport education.

HPPD10200 Physical Education Studies—Aquatics and Emergency Care 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to develop both practical competence and teaching expertise in aquatics. Students also gain qualifications in first aid and develop an understanding of the principles of emergency care.

HPPD10300 Fitness and Food for Health 6 cr pts

This unit introduces students to the role of exercise and nutrition in the promotion of health. Emphasis is placed upon students experiencing first-hand the benefits of physical activity and a variety of training modes used to develop the fitness components are explored. Students undergo a personal training program and dietary analysis as well as learn how to assess the various fitness parameters.

HPPD10400 Biomechanics for Physical Educators**6 cr pts**

In this unit biomechanical principles relating to human movement and sporting skills are explored. Emphasis is placed on understanding the science of locomotion and mechanics and how knowledge of this can be used to refine sporting technique.

HPPD20200 Motor Learning and Control**6 cr pts**

This unit introduces the field of motor control and learning. It deals with the processes underlying simple movements and skills through to the development and modification of complex motor patterns. Emphasis is given to understanding the development and acquisition of skills relevant to the Physical Education teacher.

HPPD20300 Physical Education Studies: Gymnastics and Dance**6 cr pts**

This unit is designed to develop both practical competence and teaching expertise in gymnastics and dance activities. Students will participate in the analysis and practice of artistic, educational, recreational and rhythmic sportive gymnastics. Dance activities will include aerobic dance, social dance, cultural, dramatic and creative dance. Emphasis will be placed on safe effective teaching strategies via skill progression and successful class organisation and planning.

HPPD20400 Physical Education Studies: Athletics and Games Sense**6 cr pts**

This unit is designed to develop both practical competence and teaching expertise in athletics and games sense. Students are exposed to a variety of strategies for teaching athletics creatively in a safe environment. The unit also focuses on target, net/wall, striking and fielding, and invasion games and highlights the benefits of teaching games for understanding.

HPPD29500 Guided Studies in PDHPE**6 cr pts**

This is a unit of guided reading and research investigating issues in personal development, health and physical education. It could be a small research project but is more likely to involve essays based on library/other sources research and may involve practical laboratory investigations.

HPPD30100 Exercise Physiology**6 cr pts**

This unit explores the various domains of exercise physiology in both underlying theory and practice. Emphasis is given to developing essential research skills within the area.

HPPD30200 Psychosocial Issues in Health and Physical Activity**6 cr pts**

This unit investigates psychosocial issues in sport, physical activity and health. These issues are discussed in the context of contemporary research.

HUMA15600 Communicating in the Arts**6 cr pts**

This general education unit develops understandings, skills and attitudes to enable the Arts student to be able

to communicate effectively in the various disciplines in an Arts degree. This includes communicating through the written word as well as via various electronic information technologies. All BA students undertake two modules: one in communication and one in information management. Both modules must be passed in order to pass the unit.

The Communication module focuses on aspects of communication skills, academic skills for the lecture room, and the writing of essays and other assignments and appropriate referencing systems.

The Information Management module focuses on understanding and higher order skills in the use of word-processing, spreadsheet and *PowerPoint*™ applications, as well as understanding and using information management techniques and strategies.

Both modules apply ethical concepts to issues such as academic integrity and copyright.

HUMA20000 Volunteer Experience and Reflection**6 cr pts**

Service is central to this unit. Students complete a substantial volunteer service experience (of at least six months). At College they engage in reflection on their experience within the context of reading related to Christian service, volunteering, or altruism and then complete a major report and account of their reflection.

HUMA34300 Christian Studies III—Ethics and Social Justice**6 cr pts**

An introduction to the study of ethics and social justice within a Christian perspective. A variety of contemporary ethical and social justice issues in the social, political and cultural arenas are examined selected from: inequality, bioethics, human rights, ecojustice, gender relations, violence in society and ethnicity. Opportunity is provided for student presentations on these and other social justice issues.

ICTM16400 Introduction to Information Management**6 cr pts**

This unit develops the principles and skills of information management. Students are given an introduction to practical skills in using word processing, presentation, spreadsheet, and database software. The lectures provide a background for the use of computer technology for acquiring, managing and presenting information.

ICTM16800 Introduction to Programming**6 cr pts**

This unit is an introduction to computer programming. Emphasis will be given to the basic elements of program control, elements of user interaction, and structured design principles. The unit will use the object-oriented Java™ programming language.

ICTM18000 Web Communication**6 cr pts**

The World Wide Web is currently one of the most significant communication mediums in use. This unit covers the use

of the web as an enterprise communication medium and provides students with a broad overview of strategies and techniques for achieving best practice. Students will be expected to prepare simple web pages, but more importantly, understand the several roles in the design and implementation of web pages and applications.

ICTM26900 Computer Infrastructure 6 cr pts

This unit provides an operational and management perspective of operating systems, network and Internet infrastructure. There is a strong emphasis on the implications for user experience and information management.

ICTM27500 Advanced Applications

This unit provides training in professional techniques and workflows for applications that are commonly used by Information Technology Specialists. Two applications are chosen each year to suit the requirements and interest of students. Typically this will involve graphics, processing and publishing applications.

ICTM28600 Internship in Information Technology 6 cr pts

This internship is designed for students to gain an understanding of how to function effectively in the workplace environment. The student works for a minimum of 50 hours per two academic credits earned in a professional workplace related to their field of study. On concluding the work placement, students complete a written report on their experience.

ICTM29000 Emerging Trends in Information Technology 6 cr pts

This unit examines recent issues and developing techniques in the field of information technology. The current emphasis is on electronic publishing techniques, robotics and electronic commerce.

Prerequisite

ICTM16800 Introduction to Programming

ICTM29400 Systems Analysis and Design 6 cr pts

This unit introduces the systems life cycle, basic principles of systems analysis and design, together with the tools that are used. It also attempts to highlight new directions in this foundational computing topic.

ICTM29500 Guided Studies in Information Technology 6 cr pts

Each student is required to analyse, design and present the results of a study program in information technology-related field in which they are particularly interested. The form of the written report will normally be up to 3,000 words, excluding a bibliography. The proposed area of study must be approved by the supervisor appointed by the Faculty before it is carried out

ICTM29800 Advanced Programming 6 cr pts

This unit is an advanced course in programming featuring the design and implementation of user interfaces, and a study of data structures. This unit uses Java™ as the implementation language.

This unit builds on the fundamentals of ICTM16800, to develop skill in object-oriented programming and interface techniques, and to provide experience in the use of data-structures, components and Information and Communication Technology application implementation techniques.

Prerequisite

ICTM16800 Introduction to Programming

ICTM37500 Web Application Design 6 cr pts

This unit teaches techniques for designing and implementing web-based applications for information systems.

ICTM39400 Database Management and Design 6 cr pts

This unit teaches relational database management and design, including data normalisation, SQL, database integrity, and application interface design. It includes transaction theory as applied to recovery and concurrency control.

ICTM39600 Information Technology Project 6 cr pts

In this unit students analyse, design, and implement a small information technology project either as an individual or group.

ICTM39700 Project Management 6 cr pts

The unit details the work processes, tools and management practices for planning, developing and implementing information systems in an enterprise environment. Students will have the opportunity to develop practical skills, for documentation, strategic planning, change management and risk analysis.

INFS21600 Management Information Systems 6 cr pts

A study of the growing strategic importance of information systems and how the developments of the Internet, electronic commerce, EDI and databases are fundamentally transforming the way organisations conduct their business activities. Managing the essential information technologies, system development and end-user computing. The relationship of the management information system to shared information resources.

Prerequisites

ICTM16400 Introduction to Information Management;
MNGT14500 Organisations in a Business Context

IDPS21000 Development and Practice 6 cr pts

This unit examines the strengths and weaknesses of development NGOs and a broad spectrum of development activity. Amongst other topics this unit will look at child sponsorship, development approaches, ethics, and the context within which Australian NGOs operate. There will also be a strong focus preparing students for varied ethical and operational dilemmas. This unit plays a valuable role in

preparing students for their overseas development experience in second semester.

Prerequisite

GEOH11000 Global Issues and Humanitarian Responses

IDPS25000 Guided Studies in International Development 6 cr pts

This is a unit of guided reading and research investigating issues in International Development. It could be a small research project but is more likely to involve essays based on library/other sources research and may involve practical laboratory investigations.

IDPS33000 Development Skills 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to consolidate a range of practical skills required by development practitioners in Australian NGOs, primarily relating to the Project Cycle. It will enable students to design project documentation including problem and solution trees, stakeholder and needs assessments, project proposals, AusAID submissions, evaluation and monitoring forms and Log Frames. Students will also be introduced to issues of service level agreements with implementing partners, budgeting, acquittals and participatory workshops.

Prerequisites

IDPS21000 Development and Practice *or*

IDTR22000 Development Field Experience

IDPS35000 Independent Topic in International Development Studies 6 cr pts

This is a unit of guided reading and research or field research on an issue or topic in International Development Studies. It involves the preparation and submission of a 5,000 word paper on a specific issue, topic, development case study (but not an individual country) or field of inquiry. Country studies are excluded.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of 200-level International Development units, with a minimum credit average

IDTR22000 Development Field Experience 6 cr pts

This unit involves writing a 5,000 word report on an in-country immersion experience in a developing country, usually although not exclusively in the Asia Pacific region. It is also possible for students to undergo a development experience within Australia or participate in an Avondale IDS group tour.

Prerequisite

IDPS21000 Development and Practice

IDTR34000 NGO Domestic Placement 6 cr pts

This unit provides opportunities for students to enhance their professional development through a structured workplace experience with either a donor NGO or a donor government aid agency. The placement comprises a minimum of four weeks of work experience, undertaken in a semester break, and followed by the writing of a report on both personal activities and the organisation. It should be noted that the aid agency should be

based in Australia or a significant 'other' donor nation.

Prerequisites

IDPS21000 Development and Practice

LAWS14500 Business Law 6 cr pts

An examination of those areas of business law that are most relevant to accountants and auditors. The unit will provide students with a basic understanding of civil law and legal process. Specifically, the unit focuses on the important area of contract that is the basis of business transactions, with special emphasis on contracts for the sale of goods and services. Statute law concerning consumer protection will also be discussed, as will the law of principal and agent.

LAWS26000 Corporate Law 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to acquaint students with the major business organisational forms recognised by the law. The unit is primarily concerned with Company Law and examines in detail the nature and consequences of incorporation. It also examines the major elements of the law of partnership.

MATH16000 Mathematics IA 6 cr pts

An introductory study of pure and applied mathematics, logic, sets and mappings, relations, algebraic systems, number systems, elementary functions. Techniques and applications of differentiation and integration. Simple numerical methods. Vectors in 3D. Introduction to *Mathematica*.

Prerequisite

Extension I Mathematics, or by application to the Faculty of Science and Mathematics

MATH16100 Mathematics IB 6 cr pts

This is the second unit in a sequence of introductory pure and applied mathematics. It comprises linear algebra, integration, infinite series, complex numbers, analytic geometry, and differential equations. Applications of *Mathematica* are included.

Prerequisite

MATH16000 Mathematics IA

MATH16200 Introduction to Statistics 6 cr pts

This unit is primarily designed to introduce the fundamentals of statistical methods covering topics in descriptive and inferential statistics relevant to the biological and social sciences.

MATH16300 Business Statistics 6 cr pts

A unit in quantitative methods and elementary statistical methods covering topics in basic mathematics, descriptive and inferential statistics for business.

MATH16400 General Mathematics 6 cr pts

An introductory unit in mathematical concepts and techniques. Topics include: logic, basic algebra, sets and probability, descriptive statistics, elementary functions, basic differentiation and integration, complex numbers and infinite series. Computer spreadsheet software and *Mathematica* are used to support topics where applicable.

MATH25000 Guided Studies in Mathematics 6 cr pts

Offered only under special circumstances

This unit requires a significant amount of independent reading and research on a topic or topics in Mathematics. The student will need to develop skills in information retrieval from library databases for written assignments and may be required to do some exercises and problem-solving work using *Mathematica*.

MATH26000 Calculus II 6 cr pts

Multivariable calculus: differentiation, extrema, multiple integrals, vector integral theorems.

MATH39000 Seminar in Mathematics 6 cr pts

The mathematics seminar unit at 300 level is designed to give the student the opportunity to research an area of mathematics or mathematical history in depth under the supervision of a member of the Faculty of Science and Mathematics. A variety of kinds of investigation is available for the seminar unit but it is important that this 300 level investigation build on the

established mathematical expertise of the student.

Prerequisite

Satisfactory completion of three 200- or 300-level Mathematics units

MKTG26000 Consumer Behaviour 6 cr pts

This unit introduces how consumers behave and make purchasing decisions. It examines the way in which consumers respond to external stimuli from various media, how individuals differ in their response, and how underlying psychological processes influence their response. It also examines how consumers are affected by other factors such as group dynamics, attitudes and values, personality, social class and culture. Organisational buying behaviour is also studied.

MKTG26500 Strategic Principles for Marketers 6 cr pts

This unit emphasises the importance of basing marketing decisions on a strategic view of organisations. It is designed to integrate the various functional areas of business and look at the problems of business from the point of view of the enterprise as a whole. Content includes the concept of corporate strategy; the fundamentals of strategic analysis; the formulation, development and implementation of strategy. This unit is taught with a major emphasis on case study and analysis.

MKTG28100 Marketing Communication 6 cr pts

Students gain an understanding of how promotion and advertising are used in the marketing of products and services in this unit. It examines promotional strategy development and the promotional mix elements of advertising, personal selling, sales promotion, direct marketing, public relations and publicity in an integrated marketing communication plan. The social and ethical issues involved in promotion and advertising are also examined.

MKTG28300 Services Marketing 6 cr pts

This unit examines the marketing of services as distinct from the marketing of tangible products. It considers: the characteristics of services and service organisations, the positioning of a service organisation, defining the customer base, managing the marketing mix, designing and implementing the marketing plan.

MKTG28600 Internship in Marketing 6 cr pts

This internship is designed for students to gain an understanding of how to function in the workplace. Students work for a minimum of 50 hours per two credit points in a professional workplace related to their field of study. On concluding the work-placement, students complete a written report on their experience.

MKTG29500 Guided Studies in Marketing 6 cr pts

An independent reading and research unit that focuses on selected areas of marketing which are of interest to the student. It provides the student with an opportunity to critically

review recent literature materials relating to the theory and practice of marketing. Regular tutorial periods are required for the review of the chosen literature and materials.

MKTG36000 Current Issues and Electronic Marketing 6 cr pts

This unit is made up of two modules: current issues and electronic marketing. Current Issues relates to recent events, topics and trends in marketing that are presently exercising the minds of marketers. Electronic Marketing examines the emerging interactive technologies and their impact on, and implications for marketers. Special emphasis is placed on communication and direct marketing technologies.

MKTG36200 Marketing Project 6 cr pts

Each student is to develop a research proposal with an organisation of his/her choice, gather and analyse data, and present the results in the form of a written report (3,000–4,000 words).

MKTG36500 Strategic Responses for Marketing 6 cr pts

This unit emphasises the importance of basing marketing decisions on a strategic view of organisations. It is designed to integrate the various functional areas of business and look at the problems of business from the point of view of the enterprise as a whole. Content includes the concept of corporate strategy; the fundamentals of strategic analysis; the formulation, development and implementation of strategy. This unit is taught with a major emphasis on case study and analysis.

MKTG28300 Business to Business Marketing and Sales 6 cr pts

This unit introduces students to the various roles that personnel perform in the sales and the business to business context. It is designed to enable students to develop skills and understanding of the business to business aspect of sales and marketing.

MKTG38500 Managing Marketing Diversity 6 cr pts

This unit introduces students to the complexities of managing a diverse marketing workforce, whether in a local business with a multicultural workforce or in an organisation that is geographically dispersed or international. Managing the marketing of business that intends to enter and grow in a foreign market also greatly increases the complexity of the operation. The success of the organisation will be dependent on how well this diversity and complexity is managed.

MKTG39500 Guided Readings in Marketing 6 cr pts

An independent reading and research unit that focuses on selected areas of marketing which are of interest to the student. It provides the student with an opportunity to critically review recent literature materials relating to the theory and practice of marketing. Regular tutorial periods are required for the review of the chosen literature and materials.

MKTG39600 Independent Topic in Marketing 6 cr pts

Each student is required to design, carry out and present the results of an investigative study in a marketing-related field in which they are particularly interested. The form of the written report will normally be up to 3,000 words, excluding references. The proposed area of study must be approved by the supervisor appointed by the Faculty before it is carried out.

MNGT14500 Organisations in a Business**Context****6 cr pts**

A study of the fundamental concepts of management and marketing within business organisations. Emphasis is placed on the evolution of marketing and management thought. Topics include the management and marketing environment, behaviour, strategies, decisions, analysing opportunities, and the construction and management of the organisational mix. Ethical and social responsibilities of managers are critically examined.

MNGT26100 Organisational Behaviour 6 cr pts

An introductory course in human behaviour within organisations. It examines and analyses human behaviour at the individual, group and organisational levels. Factors that influence behaviour as well as the strategies that may be adopted to increase the satisfaction and productivity of members of organisations at all levels are also examined and discussed.

MNGT26500 Strategic Principles for Managers 6 cr pts

This unit emphasises the importance of basing management decisions on a strategic view of organisations. It is designed to integrate the various functional areas of business and look at the problems of business from the point of view of the enterprise as a whole. Content includes the concept of corporate strategy; the fundamentals of strategic analysis; the formulation, development and implementation of strategy. This unit is taught with a major emphasis on case studies and analysis.

MNGT27000 Human Resource Management 6 cr pts

An introductory course examining the fundamental concepts of human resource management. It is designed to develop skills in applying these concepts to organisational issues and problems. The unit focuses on human resource management from the perspective of both line managers and human resource specialists. Topics include analysis in determining human resource requirements, planning, selection of and developing human resources, managing labour relations, health and safety issues, and future trends.

MNGT28000 Workplace Relations 6 cr pts

This unit aims to provide a broad generic introduction to the nature of the employment relationship in and out of the workplace. In particular, it will look at industrial relations which stems from the employer and employee relationship and the on-going and changing interaction between parties that provides the essential basis for describing industrial relations practice.

MNGT28600 Internship in Management 6 cr pts

This internship is designed for students to gain an understanding of how to function in the workplace environment. The student works for a minimum of 50 hours per two academic credits earned in a professional workplace related to their field of study. On concluding the work-placement, students complete a written report on their experience.

MNGT29500 Guided Studies in Management 6 cr pts

An independent reading and research unit that focuses on selected areas of management which is of interest to the student. It provides the student with an opportunity to critically review recent literature materials relating to the theory and practice of management. Regular tutorial periods are required for the review of the chosen literature materials.

MNGT34300 Christian Studies III—Professional Ethics**6 cr pts**

An introduction to the study of ethics and its application to professional persons in the business environment. Content includes a Christian basis for decisions in conflict of interest situations. The unit emphasises the application of ethics by the Christian business person to decision making, personnel management and relationships, and the formulation of procedures and policies in the business environment. Particular emphasis is placed upon Church-operated businesses.

MNGT34500 New Business Ventures and the Entrepreneur**6 cr pts**

This unit examines the process of creating new business ventures, with an emphasis on contemporary trends. These ventures may include small businesses, franchises and the purchase of existing operations. The unit brings together the business concept, entrepreneurial drive and a marketable product or service. Preparation and presentation of the business plan to potential stakeholders is an integral part of the unit.

MNGT35200 Management Project 6 cr pts

Each student is to develop a research proposal with an organisation of his/her choice, gather and analyse data, and present the results in the form of a written report (3,000–4,000 words).

MNGT36500 Strategic Responses for Managers 6 cr pts

This unit emphasises the importance of basing management decisions on a strategic view of organisations. It is designed to integrate the various functional areas of business and look at the problems of business from the point of view of the enterprise as a whole. Content includes: the concept of corporate strategy; the fundamentals of strategic analysis; the formulation, development and implementation of strategy. The unit is taught with a major emphasis on case study and analysis.

MNGT38500 Managing Diversity 6 cr pts

This unit introduces students to the complexities of managing a diverse marketing workforce; whether in a local

business with a multicultural workforce or in an organisation that is geographically dispersed or internationally managed. Topics covered include: managing across cultures, managing political risk and negotiations, organising international operations, decision-making and controlling international operations, human resource management, motivating and leading, ethics, investment and relationships with the host governments.

MNGT39100 Organisational Change and Development

This unit concentrates on the pattern of global change with emphasis on growing competition in capital and product markets. An investigation into transformation in technology, organisational structure, work methods, skills and attitudes. Consideration will be given to the critical factors incremental to change within organisations. The impact training and development will play in successful change management programs. An introduction to influential change models and tools used in organisations, with emphasis placed on innovation as a significant tool in the change process. Due to these increasingly rapid and unpredictable changes, organisations have been forced to consider, competitor strategies, shifts in economic conditions and changes in customer preferences, in more recent years managing diversity in the workplace, and the conflict of value systems.

MNGT39500 Guided Readings in Management 6 cr pts

An independent reading and research unit that focuses on selected areas of management which is of interest to the student. It provides the student with an opportunity to critically review recent literature materials relating to the theory and practice of management. Regular tutorial periods are required for the review of the chosen literature materials.

MNGT39600 Independent Topic in Management

6 cr pts

Each student is required to analyse, design and present the results of a study program in a management-related field in which they are particularly interested. The form of the written report will normally be up to 3,000 words, excluding a bibliography. The proposed area of study must be approved by the supervisor appointed by the Faculty before it is carried out.

MUHA00600 Foundations of Harmony

An introduction to the fundamentals of music theory, harmonic structures and chord progressions. This course is designed to revise all aspects of music theory, aural skills and practical that will be assumed knowledge in the music major or minor of a BA, BA/BBus or BA/BTch degree.

This bridging unit does not form part of the specialisation, major or minor in Music, nor can it be counted towards an Avondale College degree.

MUHA10600 Musicology and Harmony IA 6 cr pts

This unit is taught in two separate modules: Musicology and Harmony.

Musicology includes how to listen to, analyse and write about music of different eras and styles; Medieval and Renaissance music; discussion of styles and performance practices; and practical sessions in the performance of early music.

Harmony includes an introduction to the fundamentals of western tonal harmony, four part harmony and voice leading in particular. The knowledge and skills acquired are applied in music analysis and harmonic exercises presented in two folios.

Prerequisite

MUHA06000 Foundations of Harmony *or*

A pass in Grade V Theory, or a bridging course or placement test

MUHA10700 Musicology and Harmony IB 6 cr pts

This unit is taught in two separate modules: Musicology and Harmony

Musicology extends the concepts introduced in MUHA10600 and includes a study of music of the Baroque and Classical periods in its historical/cultural contexts; intensive listening to and analysis of major works, leading to an understanding of the development of instrumental and vocal forms in the Baroque and Classical periods.

Harmony includes a study of the harmonic language of the Baroque period with attention to Bach Chorales and the Classical period using more complex harmony. The harmonic concepts acquired are applied in short exercises. Where possible, study and analysis will link into the musical works studied concurrently in musicology.

Prerequisite

MUHA10600 Musicology and Harmony IA

MUHA20600 Musicology and Harmony IIA 6 cr pts

This unit is taught in two separate modules: Musicology and Harmony.

Musicology content includes: music from the Romantic period to Impressionism; analysis of representative works by major composers; historical, cultural and musical influences affecting formal structures and performance practices; the expansion of instrumental and vocal forms during the periods.

The *Harmony* content includes a study of the harmonic language of the Classical period using more complex harmony; initial skills in composition with links to musical works studied concurrently in Musicology.

Prerequisite

MUHA10700 Musicology and Harmony IB

MUHA20700 Musicology and Harmony IIB 6 cr pts

This unit is taught in two separate modules: Musicology and Harmony/Composition

The *Musicology* module examines trends in art music since 1900, with detailed analysis of selected compositions. Special attention is given to the music of Europe and the United States. The music is studied in relation to its

cultural contexts, including the impact of historical/political/cultural developments on the creative responses of composers.

The *Harmony/Composition* module includes the concepts, tonalities and techniques of Romantic and 20th Century music with reference to the Romantic techniques studied in MUHA20600. Students gain experience in composition writing based on acquired musical knowledge, with feedback from the lecturer and class members. Students will have the opportunity to perform their own compositions.

Prerequisite

MUHA10700 Musicology and Harmony IB

MUHA30600 Musicology and Harmony/Composition IIIA 6 cr pts

This unit is taught in two separate modules: Musicology and Harmony/Composition

The *Musicology* module examines trends in Australian art music in the context of changing Australian culture, including the impact of major social/cultural issues on the creative responses of Australian composers.

The *Harmony* module includes harmonic techniques of Impressionist music and twentieth century art music, including serialism and atonality, minimalism and postmodern idioms. Content is related where possible to the musicology units of this unit and MUHA20700; extended experience in original composition(s) based on acquired musical knowledge, with feedback from lecturer and class members. The capacity to develop a personal means of expression is provided through structured and semi-structured tasks and the development of a process diary. Students will have opportunity to perform their own composition(s).

Prerequisite

MUHA20700 Musicology and Harmony/Composition IIB

MUHI19100 Music History I 6 cr pts

An introduction to world music: how to listen to, analyse and write about music of different eras and styles including Medieval and Renaissance music. Practical sessions in the performance of early music are included. Membership of an ensemble as directed is compulsory and students are encouraged to perform in other ensembles organised in Avondale College.

NOTE: This unit is an elective only; it cannot be included as part of a specialisation, major or minor.

MUHI19200 Music History II 6 cr pts

This unit is a study of music of the Baroque and Classical periods in its historical/cultural contexts. Students listen to and analyse major works of the Baroque and Classical periods. Membership of an ensemble as directed is compulsory, and students are encouraged to perform in other ensembles organised at Avondale College.

NOTE: This unit is an elective only; it cannot be included as part of a specialisation, major or minor.

MUHI19300 Music History III 6 cr pts

This unit covers music from the Romantic period to Impressionism. Students analyse representative works by major composers and the historical, cultural and musical influences affecting formal structures and performance practices. Membership of an ensemble is compulsory, and students also are encouraged to perform in other ensembles organised at Avondale College.

NOTE: This unit is an elective only; it cannot be included as part of a specialisation, major or minor.

MUHI30700 Popular Music 6 cr pts

This unit examines issues and trends in popular music from the earliest roots of Jazz, to embrace most forms of popular music of today. Study is given to the compositional styles and techniques of popular culture. Jazz, folk, rock and pop styles are analysed, as well as the use of electronic music and MIDI. Writing styles and techniques of twentieth century popular music are applied in composition/arrangement by students, and in performance.

MUHI31400 Ethnomusicology and Contemporary Culture 6 cr pts

The development of audio and information technologies has had a powerful effect on the availability of recorded and live performances of music from cultures worldwide. This has inevitably influenced music of all styles and has brought into question traditional concepts about the nature of music. In this unit an introductory survey of historical developments in the philosophy of music in western society provides a context for discussion of universals in music, the role of music in culture, aesthetics in music, and the influence of world music on western art and popular music.

MUPF10000 Performance and Music Skills IA 6 cr pts

This unit facilitates the development of musical skills in the principal instrument or voice. Students present a 20 minute video and self-assessment. The performance component includes compulsory membership of an ensemble. Content includes the development of aural skills and the application of aural skills to listening and performing. The use of computers in music for MIDI sequencing and music notation is introduced.

Prerequisite

Admission by audition, interview and/or placement tests

MUPF10100 Performance and Music Skills IB 6 cr pts

Students continue the development of musical and performance skills in their principal instrument or voice. Students present a 20 minute jury exam. Membership of an ensemble is required. Content includes the development of aural skills and the application of aural skills to listening, performing and composing. Content includes the teaching of strings in a school environment, and techniques of directing string ensembles, conducting and rehearsal skills.

Prerequisite

MUPF10000 Performance and Music Skills IA

MUPF10800 Performance and Aural IA 6 cr pts

This unit facilitates the development of musical skills in the principal instrument or voice. Students present a 20 minute video and self-assessment. The performance component includes compulsory membership of an ensemble. Content includes the development of aural skills and the application of aural skills to listening, and performing. The use of computers in music for MIDI sequencing and music notation is introduced.

Prerequisite

Admission by audition, interview and/or placement tests

MUPF10900 Performance IB 6 cr pts

This unit facilitates the development in the student's principal instrument or voice of a repertoire exhibiting a variety of styles, periods, genres and composers which are evaluated through the presentation of a 20 minute jury exam. The unit also incorporates aural and written identification of diatonic intervals, chords and cadences, melodic and rhythmic dictation and sight-singing. Ensemble performance involves membership of the Avondale Singers or Avondale Chamber Orchestra or Avondale Wind Ensemble.

MUPF19400 Performance and Ensemble Skills IA 6 cr pts

Students further develop their musical and performance skills. Membership of an ensemble as directed is required. This class fulfills the requirements of a general American Music component.

Prerequisite

Audition and interview

NOTE: This unit is an elective only; it cannot be included as part of a specialisation, major or minor.

MUPF20000 Performance and Music Skills IIA 6 cr pts

Further development of proficiency in the student's principal instrument or in voice, with a repertoire exhibiting a variety of periods, styles, genres and composers. Presentation of a 30 minute video performance and written self analysis is required. Membership of an ensemble is compulsory, and students are encouraged to perform in other ensembles organised at Avondale College.

Students complete advanced melodic dictation in twentieth century idioms; aural identification of diminished 7th and chromatic chords; advanced sight-singing; application of aural skills to listening, performing and composing; the teaching of brass and voice in a school environment; techniques of directing brass and vocal ensembles, including continuing conducting and rehearsal techniques.

MUPF20100 Performance and Music Skills IIB 6 cr pts

This unit facilitates further development of proficiency in the student's principal instrument or voice, with a repertoire exhibiting a variety of periods, styles, genres and composers. Presentation of a 35 minute jury exam. Membership of an

ensemble as directed is required, and students are encouraged to perform in other ensembles organised in Avondale College. Organisation, promotion and presentation of a public concert.

Students study teaching in a school environment of woodwind instruments and electronic instruments/sound sources; and further work in techniques of directing instrumental groups, including conducting and rehearsal skills.

MUPF20000 Performance and Music Skills IIA

MUPF20800 Performance and Aural IIA 6 cr pts

Further development of proficiency in the student's principal instrument or voice, with a repertoire exhibiting a variety of periods, styles, genres and composers. Students present a 35 minute video performance and written self analysis. Membership of an ensemble as directed is compulsory, and students are encouraged to perform in other ensembles organised at Avondale College.

Aural skills are further developed and students undertake advanced melodic dictation in twentieth century idioms; aural identification of diminished 7th and chromatic chords; advanced sight-singing and application of aural skills to listening, performing and composing.

Prerequisite

MUPF10800 Performance and Aural IA

MUPF20900 Performance and Aural IIB 6 cr pts

Further development of proficiency in the student's principal instrument or voice, with a repertoire exhibiting a variety of periods, styles, genres and composers. Presentation of a 35 minute public recital. Membership of an ensemble as directed is required, and students are encouraged to perform in other ensembles organised in Avondale College. Organisation, promotion and presentation of a public concert.

Prerequisite

MUPF10900 Performance and Aural IB

MUPF30000 Performance and Music Skills IIIA 6 cr pts

Further development of proficiency in the student's principal instrument or voice, with a repertoire exhibiting a variety of periods, styles, genres and composers. Study of the literature and repertoire of the student's principal instrument or voice, and familiarity with major pedagogical figures in the field. Preparation for a recital in semester six. Students are also encouraged to perform in other ensembles organised at Avondale College. Membership of an ensemble as directed is compulsory.

Students are introduced to the art of improvisation. Skills acquired are applied to the study of the twelve bar blues and other jazz forms. Transcriptions of improvisations will be made.

Students will gain further experience in conducting techniques by directing in the rehearsal and performance of a work.

MUPF30100 Performance and Music Skills IIB 6 cr pts

This unit culminates the student's performance development in the Music major. Each student prepares and presents a 40 minute public recital. Membership of an ensemble as directed is required. Students arrange music of varying forms and styles for school choral and instrumental ensembles.

Prerequisite

MUPF300 Performance and Music Skills IIIA

MUPF30800 Performance and Improvisation IIIA 6 cr pts

Further development of proficiency in the student's principal instrument or voice, with a repertoire exhibiting a variety of periods, styles, genres and composers. Study of the literature and repertoire of their principal instrument or voice and familiarity with major pedagogical figures in the field. Preparation for a major recital in semester six of the course. Students are also required to perform in other ensembles organised at Avondale College. Students also are introduced to the art of improvisation. Skills acquired are applied to the study of the twelve bar blues and other jazz forms. Transcriptions of improvisations will be made.

Prerequisite

MUPF20900 Performance IIB

MUPF30900 Performance IIB 6 cr pts

This unit culminates the student's performance development in the Music major. Each student prepares and presents a 45 minute public recital. Membership of an ensemble as directed is required.

Prerequisite

MUPF 30800 Performance and Improvisation IIIA

MURE29500 Guided Studies in Music 6 cr pts

Students undertake guided reading and research on an issue/s or topic(s) in the student's chosen discipline. It may involve the preparation and submission of one or two papers (totalling 6,000 words) on a specific issue/s or topic(s) related to the relevant literature, or a series of reading reports with associated discussion. It could be based on a small research project but is more likely to be an extended essay(s) based on library/other sources research.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points at 100-level Music, and credit average

MURE39500 Independent Topic—Music 6 cr pts

Students undertake guided reading and research on an issue/s or topic(s) in the student's chosen discipline. It may involve the preparation and submission of one or two papers (totalling 6,000 words) on a specific issue(s) or topic(s) related to the relevant literature, or a series of reading reports with associated discussion. It could be based on a small research project but is more likely to be an extended essay(s) based on library/other sources research.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points at 200-level Music, and credit average

MUTR28700 European Study Tour 6 cr pts

This unit focuses on the music from Beethoven to the post-Romantics, with special emphasis on the music, sources, composers and artists associated with the tour locations—Vienna, Paris and London. Concert attendance in each of these cities is included. The music is studied in relation to its cultural milieu, including art and architecture in each location.

MUTR28800 European Performance Tour 6 cr pts

This unit focuses on the music from Beethoven to the post-Romantics, with special emphasis on the music, sources, composers and artists associated with the tour locations—Vienna, Paris and London. Concert attendance in each of these cities is included. The music is studied in relation to its cultural milieu, including art and architecture in each location. Tour members will present a public performance in Europe.

NURS10100 Foundations of Health and Nursing 6 cr pts

In this unit students are introduced to the concepts of health and nursing, focussing on the use of an holistic approach to promote and maintain health and the delivery of safe, competent and compassionate care, in diverse settings. Students are introduced to the nursing process, nursing theories, nursing roles and responsibilities, professional standards, and acceptable ethico-legal parameters for safe practice and develop beginning level technical, documentation, tertiary writing and communication skills.

NURS10200 Clinical Practice II 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to equip students with a holistic approach to fundamental nursing care skills so they can function as well informed, responsible, professional members of the health care team in the clinical practice environment in general medical/surgical and aged care environments.

NURS10300 Primary Health Care 6 cr pts

An introduction to the role of the nurse in incorporating Primary Health Care philosophy and principles into professional nursing practice.

NURS20200 Medical/Surgical Nursing A 6 cr pts

Medical Surgical Nursing A is the first of three medical surgical nursing units and examines the endocrine system, renal system, gastrointestinal system and reproductive system.

This unit is designed to develop the student's knowledge of the pathophysiological and psychosocial processes, clinical conditions and therapeutic actions when caring for the person across the lifespan with altered health status in endocrine, gastro-intestinal, renal and reproductive functioning. Issues of preventative health care and wellness maintenance will also be examined for individuals and diverse groups.

NURS20300 Clinical Practice III 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to facilitate students developing and practicing nursing skills to enable them to provide for the needs of clients with gastrointestinal, renal, endocrine and reproductive dysfunction in an holistic way.

NURS20400 Clinical Practice IV 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to provide students with an holistic approach to fundamental nursing care skills in the care of individuals with mental health, musculo-skeletal, integumentary, sensorineural, neurological and central nervous systems health care needs in general and specialist practice areas. Students will also have the opportunity to develop nursing care skills across differing age groups from the new born and child to the adult and aged person.

NURS20500 Medical/Surgical Nursing B 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to develop the student's knowledge of pathophysiological and psychosocial processes, clinical conditions and therapeutic actions when caring for the person across the lifespan with altered health status in the neurologic, sensorineural, integumentary and musculoskeletal function. Issues of preventative health care and wellness maintenance will also be examined for individuals and diverse groups.

NURS20600 Mental Health 6 cr pts

This unit focuses on the body of knowledge, clinical and interpersonal skills and the caring attitudes required for nurses to provide comprehensive, informed care in both institutional and community health care settings for the individual with a mental illness.

NURS20700 Utilising Research 6 cr pts

The process of critical analysis is explored and applied to research. The role of research in developing nursing knowledge is examined and the basic concepts of, reasons for, and strategies used in both qualitative and quantitative research approaches are introduced in order to develop the skill of critiquing research studies. The rights and responsibilities involved in conducting research are also identified.

NURS20800 Promoting Holistic Health 6 cr pts

This unit provides the student with the skills and strategies of health promotion management for individuals using the bio-psychosocial approach to health and wellness. This unit provides an understanding of the disease and wellness process and its effect on the individual as this is foundational to the knowledge and understanding required to promote health in the community. It also introduces contemporary complementary therapies as adjunct to optimal health and well-being.

NURS21900 Maternal, Child and Family Health 6 cr pts

This unit develops the student's knowledge of maternal/child and child/adolescent health. It explores the development of the person from conception through pregnancy and birth, and the experience of the newborn, infant and child/

adolescent years. It also examines the effect on the family unit with a child who has special needs: a congenital, accidental or acquired disease condition.

NURS25000 Guided Studies in Nursing 6 cr pts

This is a unit of guided reading and research investigating issues in nursing. It could be a small research project but is more likely to involve essays based on library/other sources research and may involve practical laboratory investigations.

NURS30200 Medical/Surgical Nursing C 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to develop the student's knowledge of pathophysiological and psychosocial processes, clinical conditions, and therapeutic nursing actions when caring for the person across the lifespan with altered health status in gas exchange, respiratory, cardiovascular, and haemopoietic function. Issues of preventative health care and wellness maintenance will also be examined for individuals and diverse groups.

NURS30300 Community Health Nursing 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to provide students with a holistic perspective incorporating the primary health care model to prepare students to practice professionally, responsibly, knowledgeably and effectively in a community setting and to be aware of the diverse populations within the community.

NURS30500 Clinical Practice V 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to provide students with a broad holistic approach to the needs of clients in aged care, and those with cardiovascular, haematological and respiratory dysfunction, through the development and practice of skills related to care of patients/clients in nursing practice areas of high dependency and aged care.

NURS30600 Clinical Practice VI 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to provide students with a broad holistic approach to the needs of clients in critical care (intensive care, emergency care and perioperative) areas. It also provides the student with a pre-registration clinical experience that encourages consolidation of skills in preparation for the transition to autonomous nursing practice.

NURS30700 High Dependency Nursing 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to provide the student with specialised knowledge and rationale to provide competent management of nursing care for individuals in critical areas including emergency care, intensive care and the perioperative environment.

NURS30800 Clinical Nursing Elective 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to further prepare the student for the transition to practice as a Registered Nurse. It allows the student to explore practice areas of interest and to develop and refine the sub-roles performed by nurses in the process of managing and delivering holistic care. This unit also uses a self-directed learning contract to enhance the organisation

and managerial skills and reflective practice of the student whilst caring for a client in the clinical setting.

NURS31900 Health Care of the Ageing Adult 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to develop the student's knowledge of the ageing adult, issues surrounding the health of the older adult, and the care of the older adult in an acute health care, community or home setting.

OEHP10100 Perspectives in Outdoor Education 6 cr pts

This unit services as a theoretical foundation for outdoor education. Students will be provided with the opportunity to examine and reflect on the historical development on outdoor education and its impact on current practice. Students will be encouraged to critically evaluate adventure-based experiences in light of theoretical models examined during the unit with a view to forming a personal philosophy and approach to outdoor education. The development of practical competence and experiential learning will be encouraged.

OEHP20100 Sea Kayaking 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to develop personal competencies required by outdoor practitioners to participate in sea kayaking expeditions. Students will gain practical experience in flat water canoeing, kayaking and sea kayaking and develop knowledge, skills and understanding of the way in which humans interact with and relate to the natural environment. The development of hard and soft skills into a workable instructional design will be facilitated.

OEHP20300 Expedition Planning and Management 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to develop a theoretical foundation for practitioners leading expeditions into wilderness settings. Students will be instructed on how to cater for the physical and mental well-being of clients in a natural environment. Students will gain practical experience in bushwalking and develop knowledge, skills and understanding of on track guiding.

OEHP20400 Leadership in Outdoors 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to develop practical competence and leadership skills in outdoor education. Students will study the principles of leadership, professional ethics and conflict resolution with a particular focus on bushwalking in the outdoors. Students will be given opportunity to explore various leadership styles and develop skills that will enhance effective communication, experience-based judgement, problem-solving, decision-making and group development.

PHYS16000 Physics IA 6 cr pts

With PHYS16100 this unit provides a first-level introduction to classical and modern physics. This unit focuses on classical mechanics and thermodynamics. Topics include: tools of physics, Newton's laws and rectilinear motion, linear momentum, work and energy, statics, rotational kinematics and dynamics, oscillatory motion and wave motion, fluids, kinetic theory and temperature, thermal properties of

matter, and introductory thermodynamics. The emphasis of the laboratory sessions is on correct technique, laboratory safety, rudimentary uncertainty assessment and digital data acquisition.

Prerequisites

Year 12 Physics or equivalent, and HSC Mathematics Extension I or equivalent

PHYS16100 Physics IB 6 cr pts

With PHYS16000 this unit provides a first-level introduction to classical and modern physics. Topics include: electrostatics, dc and ac circuits, magnetostatics, electromagnetism, geometrical and physical optics, special relativity, particles and waves, and atomic and nuclear physics. Considerable emphasis is placed on the historical development of thought in these areas, particularly electromagnetics and modern physics.

Prerequisites

Year 12 Physics or equivalent, and HSC Mathematics Extension I or equivalent

PHYS16300 General Physics 6 cr pts

PHYS16300 comprises a generalist, one-semester introduction to the discipline for those students with no background in physics. Topics include: philosophy and tools of physics; motion in one and two dimensions; work, energy and momentum; statics; geometrical optics; fluid mechanics; waves and sound; thermal properties of matter; selected topics in dc circuits; and introductory modern physics.

Prerequisite

A Year 12 two-unit Science unit and a Year 12 Mathematics unit or equivalent

PHYS25000 Guided Studies in Physics 6 cr pts

Offered only under special circumstances

This unit requires a significant amount of independent reading and research on a topic or topics in Physics. The student will need to develop skills in information retrieval from library databases for written assignments and may be required to do some laboratory and problem-solving work.

Prerequisite

PHYS16000 Physics IA

PHYS16100 Physics IB

PHYS26000 Classical and Relativistic Mechanics 6 cr pts

Odd years

This unit further develops topics in classical and relativistic mechanics that were introduced in PHYS16000. It assumes a much greater knowledge of mathematics and demands much greater conceptual maturity than the 100-level units.

Classical Mechanics includes: damped and forced oscillations, wave motion and acoustics, particle and rigid body dynamics, Lagrangian mechanics, and central forces. Relativity includes: time and space distortion, inertial reference frames, mass-energy equivalence, Einstein-Lorentz transforms, Minkowski space-time diagrams and antimatter.

Prerequisites

PHYS16000 Physics IA

Corequisite

MATH26000 Calculus II

PHYS26100 From Quantum to Quark 6 cr pts

This unit further develops topics in modern physics that were introduced in PHYS16100. It assumes much greater familiarity with mathematical tools, and demands much greater conceptual maturity than the 100-level units. This unit focuses on introductory quantum mechanics, statistical physics and nuclear physics.

Quantum mechanics includes wave-particle duality, the time-independent Schrödinger equation, the infinite well, the free particle, tunneling, the harmonic oscillator, atomic spectra, quantum numbers, selection rules and the periodic table. Statistical physics includes: macro and microstates, the Boltzmann distribution and statistical systems. Nuclear physics includes: radioactivity, secular equilibrium, dating methods, nuclear models, induced nuclear transformations, reactors and elementary particles.

PHYS16100 Physics IB

Corequisite

MATH26000 Calculus II

PHYS26200 Electricity and Magnetism 6 cr pts

This unit advances many topics introduced in PHYS16100. It is a second level treatment of electrostatics, including Gauss' law, the Poisson and Laplace equations, dielectrics, capacitance; electric current including displacement current; magneto-statics, including the Biot-Savart law and Ampere's circuital law; electromagnetic induction; magnetic materials, including diamagnetism, paramagnetism and ferromagnetism; advanced topics in dc and ac circuit theory, and an introduction to Maxwell's equations.

Prerequisites

PHYS16000 Physics IA

PHYS16100 Physics IB

Corequisite

MATH26000 Calculus II

PHYS26300 Electronics and Data Acquisition 6 cr pts

This unit advances the student's 100-level knowledge of circuit theory, introduces semiconductors and the analogue and digital devices and circuits constructed from them, and concludes with a focus on data acquisition technology. Topics include circuit theory, semiconductors, active linear devices and associated circuits such as oscillators and filters, integrated circuits, digital logic and common digital devices, AD-DA interconversion and communication protocols.

Prerequisite

PHYS16100 Physics IB

PHYS36000 Space Physics 6 cr pts

This unit covers standard topics in cosmology, astrophysics and space physics. Cosmology includes astronomical scales and magnitudes, expanding universe, Hubble law and standard cosmological models. Astrophysics includes: stellar life cycle, H-R diagrams, supernovae, visual and radio spectral studies, pulsars and neutron stars, galaxy morphology and formation, dark matter and gravitational lensing. Space physics includes the sun, solar corona, solar wind, earth's magnetosphere, plasmas waves and aurorae. This unit assumes both mathematical facility and a good working knowledge of physical processes.

PHYS26200 Electricity and Magnetism

MATH26000 Calculus II

PHYS36100 Quantum Physics 6 cr pts*Odd years*

This unit covers standard topics in undergraduate quantum physics including the Schrödinger equation and some of its simple solutions such as finite well, harmonic oscillator and hydrogen atom. Dirac notation, Hilbert space, operators, angular momentum and spin, perturbation methods, variational methods, and many electron systems are also discussed. This is the final unit in the area of quantum mechanics. It assumes a much greater facility in mathematics, particularly calculus and perturbation theory, and demands much greater ability with abstract concepts than 200-level units.

MATH26000 Calculus II

PHYS36200 Statistical and Condensed Matter Physics 6 cr pts*Even years*

This unit is an advanced unit covering both statistical physics and an introduction to condensed matter physics. The statistical component introduces the unit with systems of particles, statistical and macroscopic thermodynamics and quantum statistics. Examples are drawn from low temperature, laser, and condensed matter physics. The second component introduces the underlying principles of condensed matter physics, covering topics such as the thermal properties of solids, the free electron gas and electronic band structure.

MATH26000 Calculus II

PHYS36300 Electronics Applications 6 cr pts

This unit advances the student's 100-level knowledge of circuit theory, introduces semiconductors and the analogue and digital devices and circuits constructed from them, and concludes with a focus on data acquisition technology. Topics include: circuit theory, semiconductors, active linear devices and associated circuits such as oscillators and filters,

integrated circuits, digital logic and common digital devices, AD–DA interconversion, communication protocols and microcontrollers.

Prerequisite

PHYS16100 Physics IB

PHYS39000 Seminar in Physics 6 cr pts

Offered, subject to staffing and timetable constraints

This unit is designed to give the student the opportunity to research an area of physics under the supervision of a lecturer within the Faculty of Science and Mathematics.

Whilst adequate consultation with the supervising lecturer is provided, the student must demonstrate initiative and independence, and must complete the task within the allocated time frame. The topic for investigation will be selected in consultation with the supervising lecturer.

Prerequisite

Satisfactory completion of at least three 200- or 300-level Physics units

PSYC16500 General Psychology 6 cr pts

An introduction to the study of general psychology involving an introduction to research methods and critical thinking, sensation and perception, learning and memory, motivation and emotion, stress and coping, personality, intelligence, mental health and abnormal behaviour, social behaviour and attitudes. The unit is taught in the context of Christian values.

SCAP16200 Anatomy and Physiology 6 cr pts

An introduction to basic applied human anatomy and physiology of all body systems. The major anatomical structures and functional relationships of the normal human body and an introduction to basic cytology and the chemistry of life are covered.

Prerequisite

SCCH26900 Contemporary Health Issues 6 cr pts

This unit focuses on personal and public health and covers core concepts in health, major contemporary health issues, specific disease entities, life-style and its modification, physical fitness, health education, health assessment and running a health program.

Prerequisite

Senior First-Aid Certificate

SCEV36000 Environmental Values and Ethics 6 cr pts

In the context of the human degradation of the earth's environments and ecosystems, students are introduced to value systems, the definition of obligations, and the establishment of principles for setting values in and duties to the natural world.

Prerequisites

GEOH12000 Environmental Issues *or*

BIOL26200 Ecology

SCSP34300 Christian Studies III—Scientific Perspectives in the Modern World 6 cr pts

This unit discusses philosophical, religious and ethical issues arising from both historical and contemporary scientific thought. This course covers such topics as the nature of science, medical and bioethics, ecology and the environment, and science and Christianity, including issues within the origins debate.

THBB42000 Independent Topic (in Biblical Studies) 6 cr pts

In this unit Graduate-level reading and research is undertaken on an issue/s or topic/s in Biblical Studies.

THCH16500 SDA History and Ministry of Ellen White 6 cr pts

A study of the rise, development, and mission of the Seventh-day Adventist Church from the Second Advent Awakening in the 1830s and 1840s to the present. Attention is given to personalities, events and the development of biblical understandings, with particular focus on the life, role and writings of the three founders of the denomination: Joseph Bates, James White and Ellen White.

THCH26500 Early and Medieval Church 6 cr pts

This unit consists of a study of the history of the Christian church from the Council of Jerusalem through the medieval period. Emphasis is placed on the ethical, doctrinal and ecclesiological issues that confronted the early church and led to the development of an institutional orthodoxy in the West. In addition, students will examine some of the major themes of medieval church history.

Prerequisite

Six credit points of history (THCH or HIST units.)

THCH26600 The Reformation 6 cr pts

A study of European and English history in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries as it relates to the Protestant Reformation.

Prerequisites

Six credit points of 100-level History *or* Enrolment in BTh

THCH27500 Ellen White: Life and Writings 6 cr pts

This unit presents an in-depth study of the life and writings of one of the founders of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, Ellen Gould White (1827–1915). Particular attention is given to the issues that surround her on-going influence upon the Church in the 21st century.

Prerequisite

THCH16500 SDA History and Ministry of Ellen White

THCH37100 Historical Theology 6 cr pts

This unit comprises a study of the history of theology from the Reformation to the present. Attention is given to Christology, the doctrine of the atonement, soteriology, the interpretation of Scripture and eschatology; particularly as they are illustrated in the thoughts of Wesley, early Adventism, and nineteenth and twentieth century theologians. The unit

concludes with a discussion of contemporary trends and how to anticipate and adapt to them.

Prerequisite

One second-level THCH or THSY unit

THCH46500 Studies in Christian History (Early and Medieval Periods) 6 cr pts

This graduate-level unit examines the major social, theological, and ecclesiological movements that characterised the church from its inception through the medieval period. Emphasis is placed on understanding key themes and persons via primary source materials

THCM48000 Independent Topic in Ministry Studies 6 cr pts

In this unit Graduate-level reading and research is undertaken on an issue(s) or topic(s) in Ministry Studies.

THEN25000 Literature and Religion 6 cr pts

Odd years

This unit focuses on the treatment and development of the religious expression of dominant world religions in literary works. Attention will be given to the relationship between literature and faith experience. It will provide opportunity for the critique of the ways in which religious thought and related historical, sociological and philosophical concerns are expressed through literary texts.

Prerequisite

Twelve credit points of 100-level Theology

THRN22500 Guided Studies in Religious Studies I 6 cr pts

This 200-level independent reading and research unit focuses on selected areas of religious studies which are of interest to the student. It provides the student with a supervised opportunity to describe and evaluate materials in the area.

THRN32500 Guided Studies in Religious Studies II 6 cr pts

This 300-level independent reading and research unit focuses on selected areas of religious studies which are of interest to the student. It provides the student with a supervised opportunity to critically analyse materials in the area.

THRN35000 Research Seminar in Theological Studies 6 cr pts

This unit gives an opportunity for students to write on a research topic of their choice, allowing them to bring to bear the skills they have developed in the varied academic and professional disciplines that they have met as part of their degree program. It gives an occasion for integrative reflection, and the further polishing of research and presentation skills.

Recommended prerequisite

Entrance into the final year of the BTh or BTh/BMin program

THRN39500 Independent Topic—Religious Studies 6 cr pts

Guided reading and research on an issue(s) or topic(s) in Religious Studies is undertaken in the unit. It may involve the

preparation and submission of one or two papers (totalling 6,000 words) on a specific issue(s) or topic(s) related to the relevant literature, or a series of reading reports with associated discussion. It could be based on a small research project but is more likely to be an extended essay(s) based on library/other sources research.

THRN42500 Independent Topic in Religious Studies 6 cr pts

In this unit Graduate-level reading and research is undertaken on an issue(s) or topic(s) in Religious Studies.

THRN45000 Research Seminar in Theological Studies 6 cr pts

This graduate-level unit gives an opportunity for students to write on a research topic of their choice, allowing them to bring to bear the skills they have developed in the varied academic and professional disciplines that they have met as part of their degree program. It gives an occasion for integrative reflection, and the further polishing of research and presentation skills.

THSY16100 Introduction to Theology 6 cr pts

This unit aims to present the essence of the Christian faith in an Adventist context. Certain key elements of Christian belief are examined. Emphasis is placed on the practicality of the Christian proclamation and the place of Adventism within the broader Christian tradition.

THSY16200 Introduction to Worldviews 6 cr pts

Introduction to worldviews equips students with a knowledge of the seven main dimensions of worldviews. Employing these seven dimensions, students uncover, explore and analyse their own worldview, and become more aware of the worldviews of others. Students also scrutinise Christianity in general, and elements of the Seventh-day Adventist worldview in particular, from the perspective of the seven dimensions. The goal of the unit is to encourage greater appreciation for the centrality of worldviews in human life, and to develop an appreciation for the worldviews of others.

THSY27000 Ethics, Philosophy, and Science in a Theological Context 6 cr pts

This unit provides a survey of issues in the philosophy of religion, Christian apologetics, and an introduction to Christian ethics. It also discusses historical, philosophical, and ethical issues arising from the interface of science with religion.

Recommended prerequisite

THSY16100 Introduction to Theology

THSY36000 Systematic Theology A 6 cr pts

As an in-depth study of Christian theology, and the ways it has been expressed, this unit covers the nature of God, including revelation and inspiration, the nature of a human person (anthropology), and the relationship between God and humans (salvation). These doctrines are examined in

a comparative manner, viewed in relation to religion and philosophy in general and in light of the various Christian churches and denominations, in regard to their biblical foundations, historical expressions, and practical and social implications.

Prerequisite

Six credit points of Theology (THCH or THSY) units at 200 level

THSY36100 Systematic Theology B 6 cr pts

As an in-depth study of the underlying principles of Christian theology, this BA (Theology) unit covers the following areas: doctrine of law and Sabbath, eschatology, and contemporary theological issues. These areas are examined in regard to their biblical foundations, historical expressions, and practical and social implications.

Prerequisite

Six credit points of Theology (THCH or THSY) units at 200 level

THSY48000 Themes in Systematic Theology I 6 cr pts

This graduate-level unit comprises an in-depth study of Christian theology as expressed in the doctrine of Scripture (revelation and inspiration), anthropology, and soteriology. These three themes are examined from the perspective of their biblical foundations, their historical expressions, and their practical implications. Close attention is directed to their interface within a theological system.

THSY48100 Themes in Systematic Theology II 6 cr pts

This graduate-level unit comprises an in-depth study of Christian theology as expressed in the doctrines of law, Sabbath, and eschatology. In addition, it examines some of the major directions of contemporary theology. Attention is directed to biblical foundations, historical expressions, and practical implications. Special emphasis is given to the interface of individual doctrines within a theological system.

THWR36200 Comparative Religions 6 cr pts

This unit examines in some detail the historical roots, beliefs, practices, cultural influences and contemporary diversity in the following living faiths: Hinduism, Buddhism, Judaism, Islam, and indigenous religions in Australia and New Zealand.

Prerequisites

CR143 Christian Studies I
and at least one unit from the BBBS, BBOT, BBNT or THCH or THSY strands at 200-level

THWR36400 World Religions 6 cr pts

This unit introduces the basic issues in the study of world religions, and facilitates this by examining the historical roots, beliefs, practices, cultural influences and contemporary diversity in the following three world religions: Hinduism, Buddhism, and Islam. Surveys are also provided of Judaism, indigenous religions in Australia and New Zealand, and new religious movements.

Prerequisites

plus one BSBL, BSNT, BSOT, THCH, or THSY unit

VISC12000 Painting and Drawing I 6 cr pts

Creativity and expression of ideas are fostered by a network of formal and conceptual procedures, using a multiplicity of painting and drawing mediums.

VISC12300 Photography and Sculpture 6 cr pts

There are two modules in this unit of equal weighting. Both must be passed in order to be awarded a successful grade in this unit.

Module 1: Photography is investigated as an expressive form of visual arts and graphic design practice. Special emphasis is given to pre- and post-camera manipulation as a means of exploring ideas, themes and issues through black and white photography.

Module 2: Sculpture is an investigation of conventions and techniques associated with aerated concrete carving and lost wax investment casting. Themes and unit matter will be determined by the student in consultation with the lecturer.

VISC14100 Computer Generated Design 6 cr pts

Students explore, develop and resolve technical and aesthetic graphic design concepts in a computer-based environment. The unit also includes video editing.

VISC14200 Photography and 3D Studies 6 cr pts

There are two modules in this unit of equal weighting. Both must be passed in order to be awarded a successful grade in this unit.

Module 1: Photography is investigated as an expressive form of visual art and graphic design practice. Special emphasis is given to pre- and post-camera manipulation as a means of exploring ideas, themes and issues through black and white photography.

Module 2: 3D Studies investigates and employs orientations and techniques associated with contemporary three-dimensional art and design practices. Special emphasis is given to the convention of mixed-media assemblage or ceramics.

VISC19900 Ceramics 6 cr pts

Students investigate and employ orientations and techniques associated with contemporary three-dimensional art and

design practices. Special emphasis is given to the convention of ceramic practice.

VISC21000 Studio I 6 cr pts

This studio unit is designed to extend the student's aesthetic awareness and technical skills through a chosen medium. Students may embrace traditional or digital media. Particular emphasis will be given to conceptual and technical quality and methods of presentation.

Prerequisite

at least six Visual Communication units

VISC22000 Painting and Drawing II 6 cr pts

Ideas and concepts are investigated through a network of drawing and painting mediums and procedures. Particular focus is given to the human figure as unit matter. Material practice is informed through critical appreciation and historical investigation.

The portrayal of the human form is used as a vehicle in the investigation of issues that have troubled, excited and motivated artists within their own cultural and historical context and is related to contemporary practice.

VISC22100 Photography I 6 cr pts

Alternative process colour and black and white techniques are used to explore photography both as an expressive form and as a traditional means of social commentary. Digital photography and creative image manipulation skills are developed through computer 'darkroom' techniques and software programs.

VISC23000 Advanced Ceramics 6 cr pts

VISC24000 History of Art I 6 cr pts

An introductory critical study of aspects of art history, considering the historical events that shaped art ideas, trends and movements of the times and the subsequent developments which have determined contemporary concepts and practice.

VISC24200 Commercial Graphic Design Practice 6 cr pts

The necessary advanced professional and technical skills for successful Commercial Graphic Design Practice are examined

through on-site visits to, observation at, and reporting on, a broad spectrum of practitioners in various fields of Graphic Design.

Prerequisite

VISC24300 Publication Design

VISC24300 Publication Design I 6 cr pts

An exploration of the theory and practice in the design and production of print publications. Includes an exploration of typography through analysis and experimentation; the role of type in communication and design and the evolution of the printing process from traditional to digital technologies.

Prerequisite:

VISC14100 Computer Generated Design

VISC24400 Publication Design II 6 cr pts

Advanced theory and practice in the design and production of print publications.

Prerequisite:

VISC24300 Publication Design I

VISC25000 Guided Studies in Graphic Design 6 cr pts

This unit requires a significant amount of independent reading and research on a topic or topics in Graphic Design. The student will need to develop skills in information retrieval from library databases for written assignments and may be required to do some laboratory and problem-solving work.

VISC25100 Guided Studies in Visual Arts 6 cr pts

This unit requires a significant amount of independent reading and research on a topic or topics in Visual Arts. The student will need to develop skills in information retrieval from library databases for written assignments and may be required to do some laboratory and problem-solving work.

VISC25200 Guided Studies in Visual Communication 6 cr pts

This unit requires a significant amount of independent reading and research on a topic or topics in Visual Communication. The student will need to develop skills in information retrieval from library databases for written assignments and may be required to do some laboratory and problem-solving work.

VISC30000 Aesthetics, Ethics and Issues 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to assist students to critically examine the idea of the changing aesthetic within cultural, unitive, structural and post-modern frames. It explores, through an examination of historical and contemporary thought and art practice, the traditions, ideas and philosophies which establish the imagination. It aims to give the student an informed and sound basis on which, as individuals, they consider values and ethical issues pertaining to the production of creative work.

VISC31000 Studio II 6 cr pts

This is a self-directed studio and research unit designed to extend the student's aesthetic awareness and technical skills through a chosen medium. Particular emphasis is given to

definitive research, conceptual, critical and technical qualities, and methods of presentation.

Prerequisite:

at least twelve credit point of Visual Communication units

VISC31100 Studio and Research 6 cr pts

This is a self-directed studio and research unit designed to extend the student's aesthetic awareness and technical skills through a chosen medium. Particular emphasis is given to definitive research, conceptual, critical and technical qualities, and methods of presentation.

Prerequisite:

at least twelve credit point of Visual Communication units

VISC31200 Studio III 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to extend the student's aesthetic awareness and technical skills through a chosen medium. Particular emphasis is given to conceptual, critical and technical qualities, and methods of presentation with a view to the organisation, promotion and function of the student's own graduation exhibition.

Prerequisites:

at least twelve credit points of Visual Communication units

VISC31300 Studio and Exhibition 6 cr pts

This unit is designed to extend the student's aesthetic awareness and technical skills through a chosen medium. Particular emphasis is given to conceptual, critical and technical qualities, and methods of presentation with a view to the organisation, promotion and function of the student's own graduation exhibition.

Prerequisites:

at least twelve credit points of Visual Communication units

VISC31400 Design Studio I 6 cr pts

Practical work in a design studio environment to experience a mix of project work from internal and external clients; and an in-depth application of the design process from brief to press-ready artwork or intended output format.

VISC31500 Design Studio II 6 cr pts

Practical work in a design studio environment to experience a mix of project work from internal and external clients; and an in-depth application of the design process from brief to press-ready artwork or intended output format.

Continued practical work in a design studio environment to refine the student's experience of the day-to-day issues of running a design-based business and the discipline required in maintaining a professional level of design and quality product.

An examination of the graphic designer's role in screen-based visual communication in the new media, multimedia and web design. VISC14100 Computer Generated Design

VISC32000 Painting and Drawing III 6 cr pts

Ideas and concepts are investigated and given personal visual expression through network painting and drawing procedures. Emphasis is given to structural and unitive frames. Practical work is informed by study of selected developments in indigenous and non-indigenous Australian Art from its early beginnings to contemporary practice. Artworks are evaluated using art criticism and art history to contextualise various Australian art forms.

VISC35000 Independent Topic in Visual Communication 6 cr pts

This unit requires a significant amount of independent reading and research on a topic or topics in Visual Communication. The student will need to develop skills in information retrieval from library databases for written assignments and may be required to do some laboratory and problem-solving work.

VISC35000 Independent Topic in Graphic Design 6 cr pts

This unit requires a significant amount of independent reading and research on a topic or topics in Graphic Design. The student will need to develop skills in information retrieval from library databases for written assignments and may be required to do some laboratory and problem-solving work.

VITR34000 History of Art II 6 cr pts

This unit focuses on visits to significant international art collections. Visiting major world centres provides a variety of learning experiences which will enhance understanding and appreciation of the environment and culture where these collections are held and often produced. .

Prerequisites

Recommend three 100 level units

WESC38000 Work Experience in the Sciences 6 cr pts

A program of work experience suited to the student's major or minor study where the student is expected to develop a range of workplace laboratory skills and/or computational

skills, problem-solving skills, a knowledge of occupational health and safety regulations intrinsic to the specific work assignment, workplace ethics, and personal skills that relate to promoting cooperative teamwork.
